Marysville suffered the first defeat of the season in the York County Amateur Baseball League from the Devon team at Devon last evening by the score of eleven to nine. Marysville used all the pitching material they had, and although only half a dozen safe singles were netted by the winners they came when men were on bases as so did the four plays chalked up against the losers.

"Bob" Estey and "Knucker" Irvine were the opposing moundsmen at the start. Irvine was hammered all over the lot and when he got sore because two outfielders let the ball drop between them, started to groove 'em over the heart of the platter with the result that Marysville piled up nine runs in the third and fourth frames after he had held them scoreless for two innings. Keene went to the rescue and had the Marysville batters eating out of his hand.

It was altogether different with Estey who came out when his arm got sore in the fourth inning in favor of the veteran Earle MacPherson. Earle also was wild, and of the four batters who came to the plate he hit the first one, allowed the next one to hit safely, walked the next one, and let the fourth hit also. Harry White relieved MacPherson and a smart double play ended the inning. In the fifth, however, White hit the first batter and issued a free pass to the following one. McInnis was called on to save the day. He struck out the first batter who faced him but "Billie" Rutter

greeted him with a long single and the game ended when the two base runners raced home with the winning runs.

Devon's Scoring.
Devon scored three runs in the first inning. "Kenny" Staples' three-base wallop coming after Estey had given two free passes and fumbled Keene's bunt.

Nothing was done until the fourth when they added six. Three hits, two bases on balls, two errors and a batter hit by a pitched ball produced the runs. A long single following a hit batsman and a base on balls, netted the last two Devon runs.

Marysville Runs.
Marysville scored five runs in the third when the Devon fielders were napping and the hitting was hard. Five hits, three two-baggers and a triple with three stolen bases and an error, produced the runs. More hard hitting in the fourth netted four more. Three single and two doubles, combined with three stolen bases, an error and a base on balls, finished Marysville's scoring.

HAGEN SAYS
HAD NO INTENT
OF KNOCKING

New York, July 5—Bobby Jones of Atlanta, Ga., winner of the British open golf championship, was escorted in a triumphant procession to the City Hall, where he was formally welcomed home by Mayor Walker and presented with the freedom of the city.

Jones, who arrived on the Aquitania was accorded a welcome usually given to monarchs and statesmen. Bands blared and harbor craft sounded their sirens as the United States amateur champion came ashore.

Asked for details of his victory abroad the champion replied that he had "just happened" to win. He said he would not return to England until 1930, when he hoped to go back as a member of the Walker Cup team. He said that he could not afford to make another trip sooner than that, but intended to spend all the time he could in his real estate business.

Walter Hagen joined Jones in saying that an article in The London Evening News had given a false impression that Hagen had criticized English golf players gratuitously. "They asked for friendly criticism, and I did say some things to them in the hope that they would find them helpful," Hagen said. "They wanted to know what I thought was wrong with their game that they did not win, and I tried to explain it to them. Whatever was said was intended solely as friendly hints from one player to another on how to improve his game. We were all treated so well that we would never think of criticizing any one."
