HON. GEORGE H. BOIVIN, FORMER MINISTER OF CUSTOMS, FAILED TO SURVIVE AN OPERATION

Philadelphia, Aug. 8.—Hon. George H. Boivin, former Minister of Customs of Canada, died at St. Joseph's Hospital yesterday.

Mr. Boivin was operated on for appendicitis Friday night, and since the operation his condition had been reported as critical. His death occurred late Saturday. The former minister was born at Granby, Shefford County, Quebec on Dec. 26, 1882. He has represented his home county in the House of Commons since 1911.

With his wife and three children Mr. Boivin came to Philadelphia as a delegate to the Knights of Columbus Convention. He drove his motor car here from Granby and showed the first signs of illness at New Haven, Conn., a week ago. He continued on to Philadelphia and was stricken at his hotel last Monday, but physicians feared to operate because of his poor physical condition.

Condition Gets Worse.

Mr. Boivin's condition gradually grew worse and physicians decided on an operation as the only hope of saving his life. A serious peritonitis condition was found when the surgeons operated and little hope was held out for his recovery. The only chance for life was in localizing the poisonous condition. A medical consultation was held on Saturday by eminent physicians, who found that the patient was beyond their aid.

Mr. Boivin was Supreme Director of the Canadian branch of the Knights of Columbus.

Members of Mr. Boivin's family and James A. Flaherty, Supreme Knight of the Knights of Columbus, were at his bedside when the end came.

Outstanding Figure.

Ottawa, Aug. 8.—The death of Hon. George H. Boivin, former Minister of Customs and member for the constituency of Shefford, in the House of Commons, removes one of the outstanding figures from the political stage. His death, occurring in the heat of an election campaign after a session in which he was often the storm centre of debate, has aroused widespread sympathy. Acknowledged to be one of the most forceful and convincing speakers in the House, Mr. Boivin was called upon to defend himself and his government repeatedly during the debate on the report of the Royal Commission which investigated the customs department. He was the head of the customs department at the time when H. H. Stevens made the sensational charges which resulted in the investigation. Upon him depended very largely the work of laying before the House the government side of the case.

Distinguished Career.

Mr. Boivin had a long and distinguished career. Since 1904 he was actively engaged in politics in his constituency of Shefford, although he did not actually enter the House until the general election of 1911. From that year the date of the last dissolution of Parliament, he represented Shefford. He did not once suffer defeat in his constituency after his return in 1911.

One of the interesting events in the career of Mr. Boivin was his selection by a Conservative prime minister as Deputy Speaker of the House of Commons. At the opening of the first session of the thirteenth Parliament, Mr. Boivin, who had been selected by Sir Robert Borden, then prime minister, was elected to the post of Deputy Speaker. He acted in that capacity until the dissolution of that Parliament.

The appointment of Mr. Boivin to the Privy Council and also to the portfolio of Customs and Excise came in September, 1925. He succeeded Hon. Jacques Bureau, who had been suffering from an illness lasting over a considerable period. Subsequently, at the session which opened at the beginning of the present year, came the charges of mal-administration of the Department of Customs. The appointment of a committee to investigate the charges followed. Mr. Boivin was present at many of the sittings of the committee.

Part in Aziz Case.

Eventually he was brought directly into the limelight by his part in connection with holding up execution of sentence passed against one Moses Aziz, of Caraque, N. B. It developed that Mr. Boivin, at the request of the former member for Gloucester, N. B., had given instructions that execution of a three months' sentence against this man of having smuggled goods in his possession be held up.

When the committee report was before the Commons, Conservatives moved a motion of censure against the government, based partly on the Aziz affair. It was when the vote on this motion was pending that Mr. King

asked for dissolution of parliament, and eventually resigned.

Funeral at Granby.

Montreal, Aug. 8.—The funeral services of the Hon. George H. Boivin, former Canadian Minister of Customs, whose death occurred in Philadelphia on Saturday following an operation for appendicitis, will be held in the Catholic church at Granby, Que., at 10 o'clock Wednesday morning. Interment will follow beside the bodies of Mr. Boivin's father and mother, who predeceased him when he was a child.

The body, accompanied by Mrs. Boivin and James A. Flaherty, supreme knight of the Knights of Columbus, and a number of the supreme directors, left Philadelphia today and will arrive in Montreal at 8.05 tomorrow morning. He remains will be immediately transferred to the Central and Vermont line en route to Granby.

A LEOPARD ON RAMPAGE IN NEW JERSEY

Middletown, N. J., Aug. 6.—Somewhere in Middlesex or Monmouth County a full-sized Indian leopard is at large, and persons living near woods, fields and lonely roads are not stirring from their homes tonight. The great cat was unloaded at the Twin Brook Zoological Park yesterday morning, after a trip by sea and land from Singapore, Straits Settlements. Then it escaped. State troopers were sent out, fully armed, to search the regions surrounding the park, but zoological experts were of the opinion that the animal would keep under cover until night-fall. Those who had ordered the leopard from an agent in Singapore said they understood it would not attack adults, but were fearful for children.
