DEER HUNTING DE LUXE.

A group of Detroit sportsmen have evolved a splendid scheme for experiencing all the joys of a journey to the North Woods on a deer-slaughtering expedition without undergoing the hardships and discomforts usually attendant on such jaunts.

In a spacious, well-provisioned motorbus that will generously accommodate them and their equipment, they roll comfortably to the hunting grounds, knock off their deer with neatness and dispatch and then roll leisurely homeward, the slain animals draped gracefully about the roof, fenders and running boards of the bus in a delightful profusion of stiffened legs and sagging antlers that all the world may bear witness of their prowess as hunters.

This hunting de luxe undeniably has its points, but it still lacks the simplicity of the system in vogue in certain of the remaining minor kingdoms of Europe. There, in stead of being driven to the scene of the sacrifice, so to speak, the noble huntsmen have the deer (previously well-fattened so that they look more like cows and can not run so fast as to embarrass indifferent marksmen) driven in front of them, when they polish them off to the queen's taste.

The superiority of the European system is manifest. It involves no physical exertion whatsoever and reduces to the irreducible minimum the mortality among guides and doughty deer hunters.

WEATHER BLAMED AGAIN.

The weather has been blamed for almost everything. Now it is blamed for those alternating periods of business optimism and depression which constitute the business cycle.

Prof. Ellsworth Huntington, geographer and climatologist of Yale University, has established depression in the last century were caused by deficient rainfall. Lack of rain, he says, affects business in two ways: by causing crops to grow badly, and by injuring the health and spirits of the people, so that they become depressed.

The theory is interesting. No doubt the weather, in its major manifestations, has a great deal to do with business. It certainly affects the habits and feelings of human beings, as it does the growth of vegetation and the life of animals.

The next step, we suppose, will be to put the weather under a board of control, composed of business men and farmers. Or shall we have to rest content with long-range predictions—when scientists learn to make reliable ones? Given some foreknowledge of the weather, wise people could adjust their affairs accordingly.

Mr. H. Colby Smith was the unanimous choice of a Conservative convention at Saint John last evening called to nominate a candidate to fill the vacancy in Saint John County caused by the death of Mayor F. L. Potts. Mr. Smith is a son of the late Mr. A. C. Smith, who represented Saint John in the Legislature some years ago, and he is a cousin of Hon. B. Frank Smith, M. L. A., for Carleton and also of Mr. R. B. Smith, ex-M. L. A., for Sunbury.

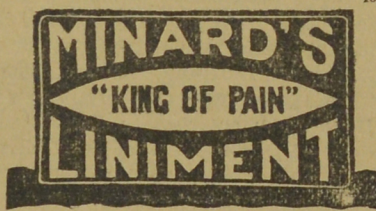
Weather Still Mild.

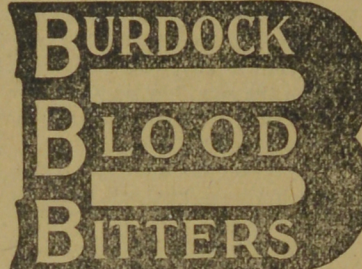

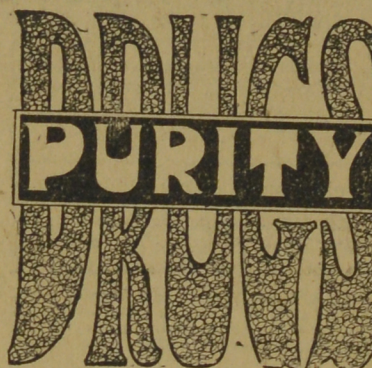
