The Deaf May be Taught to Hear by Means of Their Eyes

Research Engineer of the Westinghouse Laboratory Has Invented a Device Called "Osiso"—Translates Sound Vibrations Into Visible Waves, Which a Mirror Reproduces—Instrument Can be Carried in the Pocket.

NEW YORK, Dec. 30—Teaching the deaf to "hear" with their eyes is now a practicable possibility, according to J. W. Legg, research engineer of the Westinghouse Laboratories and inventor of a new device known as the "osiso".

The instrument translates sound vibrations into visible waves which are reproduced on a tiny mirror. Although the principle is old this is the first time it has ever been applied to a portable instrument.

A Pocket Device

Extensive experiments now being made by Dr. Robert Gault of the National Research Council in Washington are expected to lead to development of a device to be carried in the pocket by deaf persons.

By watching the mirror it would be possible for them to hear ordinary conversations and even plays and music.

The instrument being used weighs only six and a half pounds, whereas previous instruments have weighed as much as a ton.

They have been widely used by mining companies in searching for deposits of oil.

FORMER COUNSEL NOT REQUESTED TO ATTEND

P. J. Hughes, K. C., Refused to Forward Evidence in the Gould Inquiry — E. S. Carter Called.

P. J. Hughes, K. C., of this city who was counsel in the investigation before Hon. H. A. McKeown, then Chief Justice of the Court of King's Bench, of the matters concerning Hon. Arthur R. Gould of Presque Isle, Me., and the construction of the Saint John & Quebec Railway, has refused to forward to Washington the copy of the evidence taken in that investigation. Senator Walsh who is promoting the charges against Hon. Mr. Gould which are to be heard Tuesday at Washington requested that the evidence be forwarded. Mr. Hughes was not requested to attend personally.

Other Copies.

Copies of the evidence also exist in Woodstock and Saint John as well as in Fredericton. The original transcript of the evidence which was presented to the House of Assembly when Chief Justice McKeown made his report which was against Hon. Mr. Gould and his associates, could not be found in the vault of the House where it should be and was thought to be.

E. S. Carter Going.

E. S. Carter of Fairvale, King's County, who was secretary of the Saint John & Quebec Railway when the investigation before Chief Justice McKeown took place, has been asked by Senator Walsh to go to Washington and will go today. It is not known that Mr. Carter will be called as a witness but he will give assistance in the investigation by the United States Senate.

In a letter accompanying the check, Root requested that the money be made the nucleus of an endowment for the magazine, a non-profit making quarterly published by the Council on Foreign Relations.

THE GOVERNOR'S TERM OF OFFICE EXPIRES IN 1927

May Be Succeeded by Ex-Premier Foster—Other Names Mentioned.

The term of office of His Honor Lieutenant Governor Todd expires next year and unless he is reappointed the session of the Legislature which he is to open in February or March will be his last. The names of Ex-Premier Foster of Saint John, Senator Robinson of Moncton and Senator Turgeon of Gloucester are being mentioned in connection with the position. It is believed on account of his advanced age that Senator Turgeon will not seek the office, but should he do so he could undoubtedly exercise a very strong influence. Hon. Mr. Robinson's friends say that he would be content to remain a Senator, but Ex. Premier Foster's views in regard to the matter are unknown. He is not now in public life but the impression seems to prevail that if he wants the governorship he can have it for the asking. Hon. Mr. Foster was Premier of the province for six years and for a brief period was Secretary of State in the Federal Cabinet.
