Every nomination paper, with the ertificate of the City Treasurer, shall filed with the City Clerk or at his office, and not later than FOUR O'CLOCK on the Afternoon of MON-THE THIRD DAY OF JANU-ARY, 1927, and the City Clerk, before receiving such nomination paper, shall ascertain from the same that the requirements of the Election Act have been complied with.

No candidate is qualified to be nominated for Alderman unless at the time of nomination he is a resident of the Ward for which he is nominated.
