ELECTRICAL POWER.

Electric power as an aid to industry steadily becomes more important in Canada. The energy generated is rapidly increasing, the total for July, 1926, showing a growth of 21 per cent over the same month last year. Taking a twelve-month period, the increase in consumption is 20 per cent. In August last the average kilowatt hours generated daily in Canada for Canadian use reached 26,644,000 compared with 21,485,000 a year earlier.

Canada's position in electric energy is impressive when compared with that of the United States. There the increase is 12 per cent. a year, and is largely due to growth in population and increase in domestic use. In Canada, it is pointed out by the Monthly Letter of the Royal Bank of Canada, the new installations are largely for industrial purposes. "When one considers," says the Letter, "that a large proportion of this sweeping increase is accompanied by a corresponding growth in Canadian power-using factories, one comes to some realization of the rate at which Canadian industry is expanding. Per capita use of power in Canada is already 2.8 times as large as that in the United States (and at the present rate of development) it will not be long before Canadians will be using three times as much electric power per person as is being used in the United States."

Naturally, the bulk of Canadian power is generated in the Central Provinces. Indeed, Ontario and Quebec have 80 per cent. of the whole, but British Columbia, New Brunswick and Manitoba are already making healthy increases.

SAFETY ZONES.

We can all take a tip from transportation experts who brought about the construction of safety zones. We need a place to stop a moment in the midst of the traffic of living.

Abraham Lincoln's sense of humor gave him a safety zone. When the tide of Civil war seemed likely to flood the union cause, or when his assistants were rebelling at his orders, Lincoln found relief and serenity in telling a funny story.

When you think you are working too hard go back to William James. James, the great Harvard psychologist taught that there were reserves in the brain untouched. Just keep on working a bit longer, even after you think you are tired, he used to say, and you will break into a new reservoir of energy.

Weariness depends so much on the nature of your interest in your work. We grow tired when we do not like what we are doing, you may well examine into your fitness for it with a practical eye.

* CITY ELECTION *

THE ELECTION FOR MAYOR AND ALDERMEN FOR THE CITY OF FREDERICTON for the ensuing year will be held on MONDAY the 10th Day of January, 1927 at the Polling Places as follows:

DIVISION NO. 1.—For all voters residing or owning property above the northwest centre line of Carleton street, prolonged, at or near the City Hall, in the said City.

DIVISION NO. 2.—For all voters residing or owning property in the remainder of the said City, at or near the County Court House, in the said City.

* NOMINATIONS *

Every candidate for the office of Mayor or Alderman shall be qualified to vote at the election for which he is nominated and shall be nominated by at least TWO ratepayers residing in the City of Fredericton, and qualified to vote at the ensuing election for which such candidate is nominated.

Every nomination paper, with the certificate of the City Treasurer, shall be filed with the City Clerk or at his office, and not later than FOUR O'CLOCK on the Afternoon of MONDAY, THE THIRD DAY OF JANUARY, 1927, and the City Clerk, before receiving such nomination paper, shall ascertain from the same that the requirements of the Election Act have been complied with.

No candidate is qualified to be nominated for Alderman unless at the time of nomination he is a resident of the Ward for which he is nominated.

The acceptance of each candidate and the signatures of at least TWO resident qualified voters, who must sign the nomination paper, shall be proved by affidavit attached to the nomination.

In case of a contest, each elector shall be entitled to vote for ONE candidate for Mayor, for ONE candidate for Alderman for Wellington Ward, for ONE candidate for Alderman for St. Ann's Ward, for ONE candidate for Alderman for Carleton Ward, for ONE candidate for Alderman for Queens Ward and for ONE candidate for Alderman for Kings Ward.
