BANK ROBBERS  
WERE SHOT DOWN  
AT FLINT, MICH.

Flint, Mich., Jan. 13—Thirteen minutes after 2 o'clock in the afternoon on the thirteenth day of January should have been a warning to four Toledo, O., bank robbers. Scoffing at the 13 superstition the quartette robbed the bank at Hadley, a town of 300 population, near here, stepped out at the front door with bags of gold and currency in their hands and were greeted with a storm of lead.

Three of the men fell wounded in the snow dropping their money bags. The fourth reached the waiting automobile and escaped from Hadley only to drive into the hands of state police from Flint.

The robbers car appeared in Hadley about 2 o'clock this afternoon and drove through the main street slowly several times. It was 2.13 p. m. according to B. F. Hadley, telephone exchange manager, when the car stopped in front of the bank and the four got out.

Mr. Hadley's suspicions were aroused. The men were all strangers to him, and he wondered what business they had with the bank. He watched.

A moment later one of the men appeared at the bank window and pulled down the shade. Hadley's suspicions crystallized into certainty and he quickly went to storekeepers of the town, telling what he had seen and organized a posse. Meantime, inside the bank the robbers were busy.

Carefully, the posse men advanced on the bank from every side. They were close to the entrance when the unsuspecting robbers stepped from the door.

Fire opened without ceremony. The first volley dropped three of the men. The fourth reached the waiting car and drove out of gunshot range. Ira Jones, 30 years old, a Hadley citizen who was just entering the bank when the firing started, was wounded, probably mortally.

Caribou, Me., Jan. 13—The Aroostook potato market was quiet today with but few offerings. Buyers raised the limit slightly and some sales were reported at \$6.65 a barrel although \$6.50 was the prevailing offer, or \$4.10 to \$4.15 a hundred-weight, cash for No. 1 Green Mountains at loading stations. The weather was clear and cold. Shipments are holding around 150 carloads a day.
