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## LIEUT. GOVERNOR TODD IS ELECTED HONORARY PRESIDENT OF THE SCIENCE CLUB

**Accepted Office Wednesday Night—Succeeds the Late Dr. L. W. Bailey—Conrad Wright of Stanford University Gave Interesting Address Before Club Upon Development of Varieties of Wheat and Conditions in Wheat-Growing Areas of Continent.**

The home of G. W. Bartlett was the scene of a very interesting and enjoyable meeting when Mrs. Bartlett, Mrs. Wm. Kesson and Miss Jean Cooper were hostesses to the Fredericton Science Club last night for its regular monthly meeting.

In the course of the evening's proceedings it was moved, seconded and passed unanimously, that Lieut. Governor Todd, who has shown great interest in the club and attended its meetings whenever permitted by pressure of official business, be asked to honour the club by accepting the position of Honorary President, vacant since the death of Dr. L. W. Bailey last spring. His Honor, who was present briefly expressed his admiration for science and said that he would esteem it a high honor to accept the club's invitation, the more so the position had been held so lately by that grand old man of Canadian science, Dr. Bailey.

Address by Conrad Wright.

The club was fortunate in having the opportunity of being addressed by Conrad Wright of Stanford University, California, the subject of the address being "Canadian Wheat". Mr. Wright is specially well qualified to speak with authority on this subject, as he has for the past year held a research scholarship in the Food Research Institute, Stanford University. This institute, the speaker said was organized to study the food problems both of production and of distribution, of the world. On the apportionment of the fields of study, he, as a British subject found himself allotted a field of considerable interest in the empire, Canadian wheat.

He first passed a bag of samples of Marquis wheat that had been grown at "Maple Glen Farm", owned by W. G. Clark, about eight miles up the St. John River, in Kingsclear. He asked each member to pour out a few grains in his hand and to become familiar with the appearance of the three chief types of wheat kernels produced in this country.

U. S. A. Declining.

He said that the United States, formerly far in the lead among the world's wheat exporters, is acquiring a population that puts a limit to the amount available for export, and is also acquiring a demand for the production of many other crops, thus lessening the acreage available for wheat raising and that country is now declining as a world leader in wheat export.

Western Canada.

Mr. Wright dealt with the production of "Marquis" and "Garner", the two new grades of wheat, with the birth and growth of the Farmers' Movement, the Co-operative Grain Marketing Move and the worth of the Experimental Farms to the farmers. He also made us acquainted with phases of the development of Western Canada that most of the club had barely heard of before and he used official reports and census figures, as well as market statistics, to show how great had been the development that had taken place during the last half century, a change heralded by the invention of a practical reaper-binder, after the Canadian west had been spanned by two main lines of railway with their subsidiaries.

## A VOTE IS LOOKED FOR SOME TIME TONIGHT ON THE ISSUE BEFORE THE HOUSE OF COMMONS

Ottawa, Jan. 13—A fourth day of debate in the house on the Conservative amendment of non-confidence closed without a division.

The Government whip stated this afternoon that a division on the non-confidence amendment is not expected before tomorrow (Thursday) night.

J. L. Brown, of Lisgar, was the only Progressive speaker and, like previous Progressives, he made no positive statement how he would vote in the Government crisis.

Interesting developments are promised for tomorrow at the end of which the vote is expected. It will be pointed out to the House by the Government through one of its ministers first that the vote on Mr. Meighen's amendment will not be regarded by the Liberals as a want of confidence vote, but a vote, deciding the constitutional question involved in that amendment, namely, that of the existence or non-existence of a government because of the absence of its Prime Minister.

Another Convention.

Another contention to be made tomorrow by Government speakers is that should the Meighen amendment carry it would mean the immediate termination of this session because by approving an amendment which strikes out all the words after "that" the House declares that it will not consider the Speech from the Throne. That is equivalent to ending the session. If such an amendment were adopted by the House Premier King would go to the Governor-General and advise him that Parliament had refused to consider the throne speech.

Would Consult Meighen.

His Excellency would also be advised, to consult with Mr. Meighen. In view of the refusal of parliament to entertain the throne speech and the consequent termination of the session two alternatives would be presented to Mr. Meighen by His Excellency. One would be to ask for the summoning of another session and the other would be to ask for dissolution.

Liberal Hopes.

It is hoped by the Liberals that some of the few Progressives who favor Mr. Meighen's alleged tariff

to carry on that Government from session to session without dissolution and he will do so just so long as he received parliamentary support." Mr. Brown referred to Mr. Guthrie's statement as clearly a bid for support.

"I have no objection," Mr. Brown hastened to add, "to either party placing before us the claims they have to advance."

Legitimate Bid.

"It is a legitimate bid," interrupted Mr. Chaplin, Conservative of Lincoln.

"Yes," agreed Mr. Brown, "it is a legitimate bid. And it is just as legitimate—"

Here Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, Conservative leader, broke in:

"The honorable gentleman argues that it is a bid for support," said Mr. Meighen. "What could come to the Progressives by virtue of that bid that certainly would not come to them if the bid were never made?"

"It is not a bid, it is a statement of fact," commented Mr. Sewart, Conservative, of Leeds.

Mr. Brown replied "A statement of that kind, when coupled with the assurance that they would be able to carry on for five years without another election is undoubtedly a bid."

Quebec May Judge.

During the afternoon Major C. G. Power (Liberal, Quebec South), remarked that Progressives sat in judgment now. But they should remember that perhaps tomorrow the 61 Liberal members from Quebec might be judges.

Hon. R. J. Manion (Conservative, Fort William) declared that the whole speech from the throne was a complete bid for Progressive support. Dr. Manion asserted that for Premier King to continue to occupy
