YOUNG ENGLISH GOLF PRO WON AT LOS ANGELES

**First Prize Was \$3,500
Youngest Pro in the
Tournament—Fine
Performance by Him.**

Los Angeles, Jan. 13—Youth held its sway in the greatest golf tournament ever held in the West, when thousands watched Harry Cooper, youngest professional in the tournament take away first prize of \$3,500.

The 21-year-old English lad of the Tenison Park Golf Club, Dallas, Texas, was the favorite through the three days' play in the \$10,000 event. He went through 72 holes of golf with a total of 279 strokes, carding for each 18 holes the following: 70, par, on the south course; 68, four under par, and 67, five under par on the north course, over which the final 36 holes were played.

George Von Elm, Los Angeles amateur, another dapper youth, full of pep, but not quite possessing the vigor and self confidence of Cooper ambled in second, taking the honors but passing over the \$1,500 purse, not wishing to turn professional.

Al Espinosa, Chicago and Joe Kirkwood, New York professional, with cards of 285, split the \$1,500 second and \$1,000 third prize.

THREE TEAM IN PLAYOFF FOR STANLEY CUP

Montreal, Que., Jan. 13—After a special meeting of National Hockey League executives, Pres Frank Calle announced that the applications for franchises from Brooklyn, Jersey City, Detroit and Chicago had been held over for further consideration.

The player limit clause was left as at present, each club being allowed 12 players under contract and two on the reserve list.

Playoff arrangements were clarified. Three teams will battle for the title and the right to compete for the Stanley cup. The first team will draw a bye and the second and third teams will play a home series total goals to count, for the right to meet the leader in the final championship games.

In event of a tie for first place the two deadlocked teams would play a "sudden death" game for the right to earn a bye. Should there be a tie between two teams for second place, the usual two game series for the right to meet the leaders would be conducted.

In case three teams are tied for second place, there would be a toss of a coin for home games and "sudden death" tilts to eliminate one of the contending clubs. The two others would then proceed with the playoff series to meet the leaders in the finals.

OTTAWA MADE FIRST PLACE A LITTLE Surer

Beat Pittsburgh 1 to 0—Canadiens Also Have Strengthened Position by Beating New York.

Ottawa, Jan. 13—Ottawa Senators registered their twelfth National Hockey League victory of the present season when they defeated Pittsburgh Pirates here tonight by a score of 1 to 0.

The game was unique in that the puck never entered the net either by fair or offside routes during the entire 60 minutes of play. The goal that gave the game to Ottawa was a gift, Cooper-Smeaton ruling that the Senators were entitled to a tally when Hooley Smith's chances of scoring late in the second period were spoiled by a Pittsburgh stick hurled across and along the ice.

Canadiens Won Again.

New York, Jan. 13—Montreal Canadiens have dug a trench around their third position in the National Hockey League. They invaded the field of the New York Americans here tonight and sent Rickard's men scurrying before a driving combination attack to the second defeat of the week. In taking their 2 to 1 win tonight the Canadiens turned in their second victory in consecutive night. In Boston last evening they defeated the Bruins 4 to 2.

FREDERICTON CURLERS MADE EVEN BREAK

Saint John, Jan. 14—Five rinks of Fredericton curlers arrived in the city yesterday and broke even with the Thistles and Carleton, winning from the former club by a total score of 56 to 55, and losing to Carleton by a total score of 73 to 69.

The clubs curled against each other afternoon and night, and the small majority made by each club showed that the matches were very interesting. Three rinks aside curled on the Thistle ice in the afternoon with Fredericton winning by a score of 36 to 24, but in the night play, two rinks aside, Thistles gained and finished 31 to 20, and the match was not won until the last end when the capital skip E. H. Fowler took three points from Thistle skip W. A. Shaw.

CHATHAM WON FROM BATHURST IN RAGGED GAME

Score 3 to 1 Bathurst Scored First—Finnigan Again Put Up a Great Game.

Chatham, Jan. 13—Chatham defeated the fast traveling Bathurst sextette 3 to 1 in a regular M. A. H. A. game in St. Thomas' College rink tonight. The game was witnessed by about 1,300 fans. Tonight's hockey was not of the dashing brilliant kind handed out in the Chatham-Campbellton game last week. The playing of both teams was rather ragged—at times. Neither side used combination to any great extent.

Finnigan in the net for the visitors gave a fine exhibition of net-minding. Carvell, the local goalie, was also in excellent form. Only two penalties were handed out, one to each side.

The visitors drew first blood when Lawlor broke through the local defence and beat out Carvell. The local forwards hammered shots at Finnigan in rapid succession and finally one of Pop Kerr's bullets found its way into the net.

Chatham forged into the lead when Keating sagged the net after a nice end to end rush.

The second period was scoreless. Shot after shot was rained upon Finnigan but he blocked them safely.

The visitors made a determined effort to score in the final period. The locals went safely in the lead when Duncan whipped the disc past Finnigan for the third counter. Bathurst strove valiantly to score but Carvell was impregnable. The final gong sounded with the locals on the long end of a 3 to 1 score.

TORONTO VARSITY WON SIX GAMES IN THE STATES

Beat Boston College Grad Team in Last Game—Total Scoring Was 33 to 2.

Boston, Mass., Jan. 13—Toronto University scored two goals in the waning minutes of the first period at the Arena and consequently defeated Boston College undergraduates, and graduates 2 to 0 in the greatest hockey game of the Varsity visit. During the first two periods the talented Canadians carried the game right up to the eagle satisfactory innumerable times, but when the third period opened, the Boston team took command and played some great forcing hockey to the end that the brilliant Canadians were pushed back on the defensive and had all they could do to keep the game in control.

Still Toronto won the hockey game and goes back home with a record of six games won and none lost for the two weeks play on Boston ice. During this period Varsity has scored 33 goals and has permitted only two to enter its cage. Dartmouth, Harvard and Boston University in addition to the Eagles were shut-out victims.

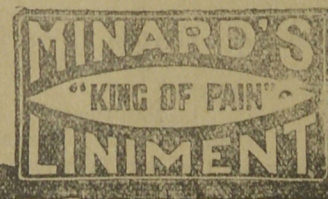

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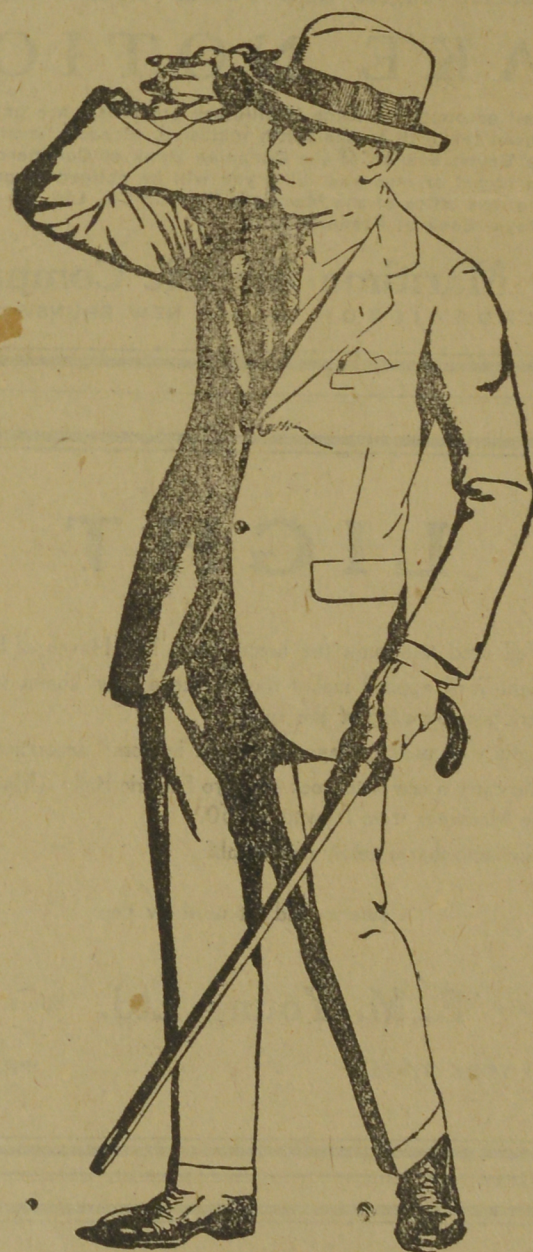
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
