ABOUT KICKERS.

AN EXCELLENT SPEECH.

Mr. F. C. Squires the junior member for Carleton, spoke on the budget debate in the House yesterday afternoon. Mr. Squires is a man of genial personality, a graduate of the U. N. B. and a lawyer by profession, who seems to be admirably equipped for service in public life. His speech of yesterday was one of the most forcible and eloquent which the House has listened to from the lips of a private member so far during the present session. Young men of force and ability are urgently needed in the public life of this province, and it is gratifying to note that the present House contains more than the usual quota. Mr. Squires enjoys an enviable reputation as a legal practitioner in his home county of Carleton. He entered public life with high ideals and those who have the pleasure of his acquaintance have not the slightest doubt but that he will rigidly live up to them.

Mr. Squires of Carleton in the course of an able speech in the Legislature, made a strong plea for the encouragement of tourist travel. He dwelt particularly upon the attractions of the St. John Valley and of the importance of encouraging fly fishing on the Saint John River. "We have at Hartland, twelve miles above Woodstock," said Mr. Squires "what is believed to be one of the greatest salmon angling pools in the world." He went on to say that there were numerous other salmon pools along this river in the counties of Carleton and York, which could be made a magnet for tourists and a source of revenue to the province by well directed publicity and a more vigorous enforcement of the Federal fishery laws.

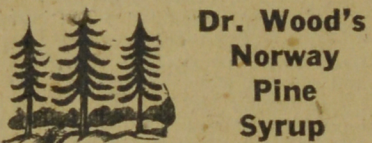
