7855 people died of consumption in Canada in 1923. Several other diseases have high death rates, but the average death from those is between the ages of 50 and 60. The average age of those dying from tuberculosis is males 37 years and females 33 years. These citizens are lost at their most productive period.

Each death from tuberculosis cuts life short on an average of 29 years for males and 24 years for females.

Had they lived for a normal life period each would have earned on an average at least \$7,900.00.

Thus with 405 deaths from tuberculosis in N. B. last year the money loss to the province for one year was \$3,199,500.

Think of this waste of time and money along with the grief and suffering caused by sickness and death from tuberculosis.

We want population. Why not save what we have?

BARS SMOKING MINISTERS

Atlanta, Ga., Nov. 19—Ministers applying for membership in the North Georgia Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South must take a solemn pledge to abstain from tobacco in all of its forms before their application will be considered, according to a ruling yesterday by ministers of the conference in session here.

The decision was handed down in connection with the application for membership of a young minister who admitted he used tobacco. Asked if he could give it up, he said he would "try."

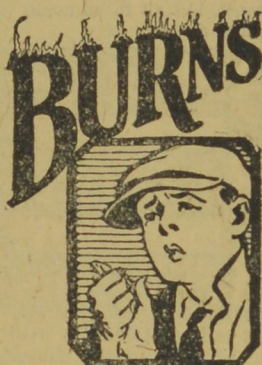
This answer, however, was not sufficient with several of the conference members and the young man finally promised to abstain from the use of tobacco.

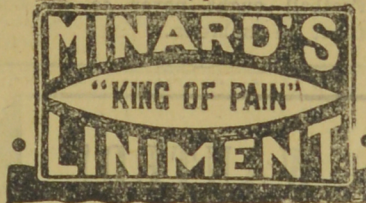

BURMESE WHITE ELEPHANT REACHES NEW YORK; THE ONLY SPECIMEN NOW IN CAPTIVITY

Pawa, said to be the only white elephant in the world and certainly the first white elephant to make its appearance around these parts for many a long moon, arrived here today on the Atlantic Transport liner Minnetonka from London.

With Pawa was its owner, Dr. Saw Durney Po Min, a Burmese Christian, who captured the elephant eight years ago in the Yamethin district of his native land. Because the Burmese Buddhists regard a white elephant as a sacred object, it was necessary for Dr. Min to keep his treasure hidden in the jungles of Burma for six years. Only the aid of the London Zoological Society enabled him to get Pawa out of the country, and since leaving Burma he has received scores of threatening letters from Buddhist zealots.

Dr. Min brought Pawa to the United States to exhibit with the Ringling Brothers-Barnum & Bailey circus, now in winter quarters at Bridgeport, Conn. Pawa is to be shipped some time today by the American Railway Express Company via the New Haven Railroad to Stratford, Conn., where special quarters have been built.

The white elephant is to be kept separate from the other circus elephants, so that it may be guarded with particular care in view of the many threats received by its owner. An idea of how greatly Pawa is valued by its owner may be gained from the fact that he has requested the circus authorities to insure the elephant's life for \$7,500.00.

Tells of Capture.

Pawa was captured when a baby, about 18 months old.

"I was elephant hunting in the jungle," Dr. Min explained, "and had been out for about two months. Our party had had good success, rounding up many large elephant herds. Our method was to build a stockade into which the elephants would come during the night, the gates would close, and in the morning we would find them there. Each night during the hunt we would say prayers, asking the Deity to send us a good catch."

"Pawa came into the stockade with a herd of about twenty elephants. At first we did not know he was a white elephant. He was covered with mud and all black. Then I happened to notice his eyes—light colored and rimmed with pink. I told the men to wash him off—and he was a real white elephant!"

According to Dr. Min, there is at present no other genuine white elephant in the world. In Burma and Siam there are elephants with whitish, mottled skins which are referred to as white elephants, but their skins are only light colored as the result of a skin disease. Pawa, on the other hand, is the real article—an albino of its species, with light skin and pink eyes. According to P. Chalmers Mitchell, secretary of the London Zoological Society, Pawa is one of the rarest zoological oddities.

After capturing Pawa Dr. Min was in a quandary as to how to dispose of his treasure.

Buddhist Belief.

"The Buddhists believe that Buddha came to this earth in the womb of a white elephant, and to them the animal is most sacred," he explained. "Also, they have a legend that when the white brothers fight and the air is filled with flying things which drop projectiles, spreading death, a white elephant will come to watch over the true believers, will keep them safe and

enable them to conquer the white fighters. And beside all this, they believe that a white elephant will bring good crops and good luck to the country."

"I knew then that if Pawa were found I would have difficulty in getting him out of the country. I kept him hidden in the jungle for six years, telling only the officials of the London Zoological Society about him. At last I gave two elephants to the London Zoo and two more to the Rangoon Zoo and the Zoological Society and the British Government arranged for the white elephant's export. But no sooner had I taken Pawa away than I started to receive letters threatening both our lives. The Buddhists would rather kill us both than have him away from the country."

From Burma Dr. Min took Pawa to London and it was there he met representatives of the Ringling Brothers and negotiated for the American tour.

Shipping Difficult.

The shipment of Pawa was no simple matter. In order that the animal would not become nervous or lonely another elephant, this one a female named Moya Aung, was taken along for company. On the trip the two were kept in stalls side by side, and with the exception of one day, when Pawa became slightly seasick, the voyage was featured by peace and quiet among the pachyderms.

In telling of Pawa Dr. Min said that the animal's name may be translated as "Mr. White Elephant" or "Sir White Elephant." Pawa is now 9 years old and weighs about two tons. He eats two bales of hay and quantities of potatoes and apples every day.

Dr. Min is prominent in Burmese Christian circles, being president of the Loyal Karen Association of Burma and the Karen Christian Peoples. He is also well known in England as a hunter and naturalist.

Assisting him in transporting Pawa were five young Burmese Christians, only one of them a "bahoti," or professional elephant driver. The other four were law, medicine and divinity students. All Pawa's attendants, therefore, regarded the elephant as just an elephant and nothing more. Neither Dr. Min nor his assistants have retained any fragments of native superstition.

The last white elephant seen in America was brought here by P. T. Barnum in 1884, and proved more or less of a disappointment. Crowds turned out expecting to see an animal as white as snow, and were more or less annoyed to discover that the elephant, though much lighter than the ordinary Indian elephant, was far from lily like.

RUSHDI BEY CONFERS WITH TCHITCHERIN

Odessa, Ukraine, Nov. 19—Foreign Ministers Tchitcherin of Soviet Russia and Tewfik Rushdi Bey of Turkey, meeting for their much-discussed conference, had a private conversation lasting three hours today.

Afterward it was stated that they went over all the questions of international interest to their two countries. The "highest satisfaction" was expressed that their "long-established common views remained unchanged."

Turkey's foreign policy is directed toward world peace and friendly relations, Rushdi Bey told newspaper men today. He said his presence on Russian soil was the best proof of the cordial relations between Turkey and Soviet Russia.

"Turkey's foreign policy," he said, "is directed to the support of the world's peace and the friendly relations between neighbors. The recent treaty between Turkey and other countries is an indication of this."

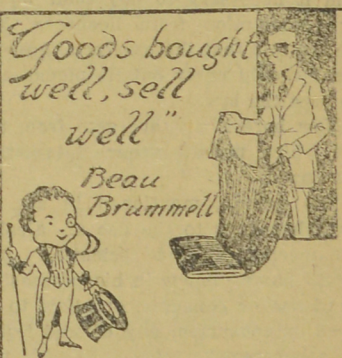

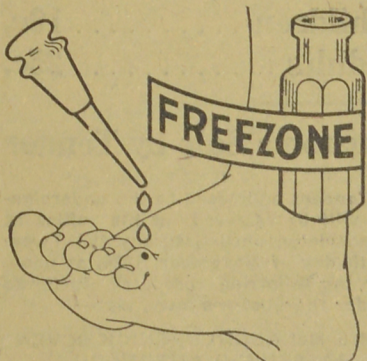
