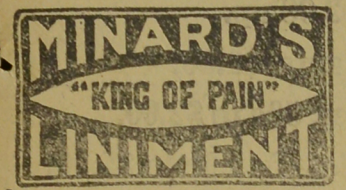

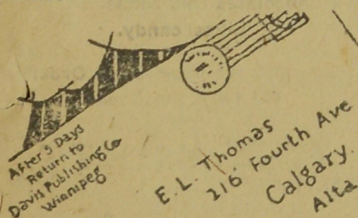

#### Cabbage and Pimento Salad.

Take 1½ cups coarsely chopped cabbage, 1 cup diced celery, 1 can pimento and 1 medium size onion. Mix together and cover with following salad dressing: 2 tablespoons sugar, 1 scant tablespoon mustard, 1 full tablespoon melted butter. Mix dry ingredients and melted butter a beaten egg and milk. Put on stove and when it starts to cook add vinegar gradually.

#### TOMATO-JELLY SALAD.

To one can stewed and stained tomatoes add one teaspoon each of salt and powdered sugar and 2 3/4 box gelatin, which has soaked fifteen minutes in ½ cup cold water.

Pour into small cups and chill. Run a knife around the inside of molds so that when taken out shapes may have a rough surface suggesting a fresh tomato. Place on lettuce leaves and garnish tops of each with mayonnaise dressing.

#### TWO-MINUTE SALAD.

One and one-half cups pickled beets (diced), 1 small onion (chopped fine), 1½ cups cucumber (diced), 1 tablespoon chopped parsley vinegar, lettuce, Thousand Island dressing. Thin Thousand Island dressing with vinegar to taste and pour over the vegetables that have been lightly mixed together. Add salt and pepper to taste and serve on lettuce.

#### AUTUMN SALAD.

One cup tart apples (diced), 1-2 cup seeded raisins, 1 cup choice celery (cut fine), 1-2 cup broken nut meats, 3 maraschino cherries, lettuce, mayonnaise. Mix together all the ingredients, except cherries with mayonnaise, pile on lettuce leaves and garnish with slices of cherries.

## SANTA CLAUS IS NOW 300 YEARS OF AGE

A peculiar significance attaches to the observance of Christmas this year. This Christmas will be something more than religious holiday, the occasion of gift giving, the day of Santa Claus' annual visitation. This is the three hundredth anniversary of Santa Claus' first immigration to America. In 1626 Peter Minuet purchased the island the Indians called Manhattan and the Dutch founded thereon the colony of New Netherlands and the town of New Amsterdam. With them to the New World the Dutch colonists brought their sturdy qualities of character, the customs of their homeland, and most blessed of all, that patron saint of childhood, Santa Claus.

In the beginning December 6 was St. Nicholas (Santa Claus) Day and was so observed in New Amsterdam. It was not until 150 years later that the day of Santa Claus' visit was shifted to New Year's Eve and then, finally, to December 25, the present day of observance.

Three centuries ago the little Dutch children on the island that is now the heart of New York City put out their shoes, with hay, straw and a carrot for Santa Claus' white horse, for at that time Kris Kringle had not yet acquired his "eight tiny reindeer." When they awoke in the morning, if they had been good, the fodder was gone and in its place were toys and sweets.

When the English captured New Amsterdam in 1664 and renamed the town New York, they abolished the public observance of Santa Claus Day but the children of Dutch-descent continued to believe in their patron saint and converted the English-descended children to their belief.

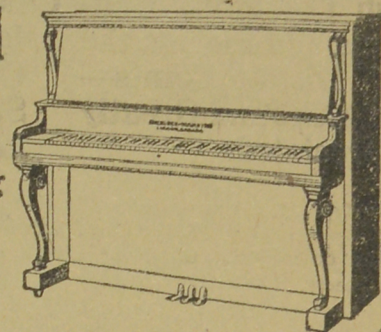
