

If the term is permissible in connection with such a movement as a general strike it may be said that the great struggle between parliamentary government and trades unionism is na constitutional manner.

Sum of Disorder Small

There has been much disorder in varicus places, but its sum, reckoned in comparison with the magnitude of the conflict, is small, as tostified even in the communique issued by the government tonight. What it may develop into later should the struggle unfortunately be protracted, nobody dares predict. There still appears little prospect of a renewal of the peace negotiations. The difficulty of such renewal, on the surface, seems almost insuperable, owing to the feeling. aroused on both sides that it would be impossible without great loss of prestige to make the first advance. In this respect it would seem to an tal suppression of newspapers by the strike acts detrimentally not only u the government and capitalist cause, which it was intended to emphasize, but also to the strikers themselves. The disappearance of this forum of public discussion naturally keeps the general public in more or less ignorance of the exact state of affairs in the country and leaves the way open for all sorts of alarming rumors to spread.

Although the government and the labor side is each publishing its own paper the difficulty of distribution as well as of production are so great that the papers reach but a small portion of the populace.


