## ARTIFICIAL ICE FOR NEW SIX TEAM O.H.A. GROUP

**Big Amateur Teams Also Making Changes in Organization — Will Not Depend on Natural Ice.**

Toronto, May 6—Minor professional hockey in Western Ontario appears to be a dead issue, a dream that fortunately never came true. Last night representatives of five Ontario Hockey Association clubs were in session with some of the O. H. A. officials at a meeting here, and it was decided that if conditions are favorable the clubs will stick to the leading amateur association, and form a group in which six teams will play, and all must have artificial home ice.

Windsor, Niagara Falls, Stratford, Hamilton, Rowing Club and London were represented at the meeting and the O. H. A. officials agreed to call an executive meeting here on Friday night and discuss the situation.

The westerners would like to have the University of Toronto graduate team enter this group. It is proposed that the series be started in November and in this way it would be possible for each team to play 30 games, with the first, second and probably third, teams figuring in the play-off series.

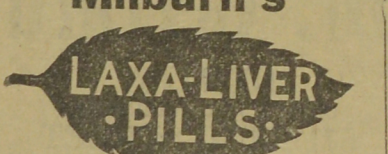
This group would furnish most interesting hockey and the numerous games would be a real attraction for the fans. There is little doubt but that the venture would be a success one of the best moves yet made in amateur hockey.

All the clubs have rounded out powerful aggregations and Hamilton in particular expects to do a real "comeback" in the great winter pastime. Optimistic reports have come out of Windsor and Stratford while the London team is practically the same as that which won the Western Ontario group championship this past season.

## ALLAN CUP HOLDERS WRECKED FOR NEXT SEASON

**New York Rangers Have Signed Several Port Arthur Hockey Players — Brydge to Leave.**

Toronto, May 6—Despite the efforts of the Port Arthur officials to keep the Allan Cup holders intact for the 1927 season it now seems assured that the amateur champions of the world will be wrecked. Capt. Billy Brydge arrived here on Sunday and attended yesterday's game at the new Leaf Stadium. He declined to state where he will locate but he announced that he will not return to Port Arthur and he also sent a telegram to the Port Arthur club officials advising them of his final decision.

It is known that several O. H. A. clubs would like to secure the services of the Port Arthur stars and rumor has it that Chipman and Cox will be in Western Ontario in time to qualify. From reliable sources it has been learned that the New York Rangers have signed Goal-keeper Chabot and Alex. Gray the clever centre man. Whyte of the Fort William seniors, it is alleged signed with the Rangers, has since regretted his decision and will refuse to report. A court case will likely result. Whyte is not heavy but is said to be a clever performer.

It is now known that the New York Rangers have signed "Ching" Johnson of the Minneapolis Club of the Central League, but that Johnson is anxious to break up the agreement. Johnson is the property of the Western League and it is unlikely that Frank Patrick will agree to allow him to go to the New York Club unless the latter pays a heavy price. By many Johnson is rated as the best defense man in the west.

In signing players in the west while the agreement was still in force between the Western Canada and the National Hockey League the New York owners opened the way to be severely criticized by others who had kept faith. Tex Rickard however stated at Montreal last Saturday that he was opposed to the breaking of agreements and that he would see that justice was done in regard to this raid. Frank Patrick also promised that a suitable adjustment would have to be made.

In the meantime it is said that Grey and Chabot of the Port Arthur team will not report at New York but Captain Brydge stated that he knows nothing about the raid except that Manager Smythe and Col. Hammond visited the western cities.

## Mlle. Lenglen's VISIT TO STATES NOT RECOGNIZED

**The United States Lawn Tennis Association Has Declined to Make Any Comment — Pyle Confident.**

New York, May 6—United States Lawn Tennis Association declined either to take official cognizance at present of the expected visit of Suzanne Lenglen to this country to fulfill a motion picture contract or to act on a request to sanction her participation in exhibition matches here.

The association's attitude was made known after a meeting of its advisory committee which had received from C. C. Pyle, Chicago promoter and manager of "Red" Grange, to grant official sanction for Mlle. Lenglen to engage in exhibitions in connection with her movie engagements.

Jones W. Mersereau president of the U. S. L. T. A., issued this statement:

"The United States Lawn Tennis Association knows nothing officially regarding the proposed trip of Mlle. Lenglen recently announced in the newspapers and until information is received from the French Lawn Tennis Federation no official expression will be made."

Informed of the association's position Pyle asserted it would not affect his plans to carry out the contract negotiated in France recently. He said he would go abroad in June to arrange final details for the French star's visit.

At the same time Pyle indicated an avenue for compromise with the U. S. L. T. A. by announcing he would seek to have Mlle. Lenglen change her mind and come here in time to participate in the national women's championships at Forest Hills, N. Y. starting Aug. 16.

The association has made no formal comment on this phase of the matter, but it has been felt by officials that Mlle. Lenglen if she comes to this country at all, should compete in the title tournament as a return courtesy for the participation of Helen Wills, American champion in France this Summer.

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## DETROIT SURE TO HAVE HUGE NEW ARENA

Detroit is practically assured of \$1,500,000 auditorium and sports arena to be completed by Dec. 1, 1926, according to advices from that city. The building will be erected on a downtown site or on a Highland Park location. The latter site lies about opposite the Ford plant, in Highland Park. It will be 350 x 250 feet, and will seat 18,000 persons for boxing and 15,000 for hockey and other events. P. R. Bierer and Morris Friedberg will be the principal owners of the hockey outfit in the pro league, it is declared. Bierer is part owner of the Fairbairn Hotel, as well as a local business man of standing. Other business and professional men are interested in the proposition. The building will be owned by a syndicate known as the Detroit Auditorium Company. The structure will be used for hockey, boxing, convention, grand opera, circuses, political meetings, auto shows, and other events of a like nature. Bierer and his interests have been admitted to the pro league, despite information to the contrary, says a Detroit despatch. The meeting that will be held in Montreal in a couple of weeks is expected to verify this statement. Bierer's interests have purchased the Victoria team, champions of the Western League, now defunct. Bierer and Friedberg, however, it is said, have purchased other stars from defunct clubs in the Western loop. McIntyre of Edmonton, Denny of Saskatoon and Oliver of Calgary are among the puck chasers purchased by the Bierer and Friedberg interests. Oliver has been sought by many professional clubs.
