NOVEL ACCESSORIES.

Handbags and purses of green snakeskin or lizard skin are among the spring accessories.

Slave bracelets grow larger linked each day. Among the favored types are those combining imitation jade links with dull-finished gold links of large size. Even diamond bracelets are now being made in large link form.

Coats for spring are either those with cape effects or those of straight lines. We see very few flared-hemmed garments other than dresses. Navy blue, green, tan, brown and plaid materials are those which will be prominent this spring for coats and suits.

Matching accessories is a fad or the moment. This week we find sets consisting of bloomers, brassieres, garters and handkerchiefs in matching shades. Taupe bloomers, garters, stockings, handkerchiefs and brassieres, for instance, are chosen to match a taupe frock. Hat and wrap may be contrasting.

Lovely, indeed are the latest evening shoes which combine colored satin vamps with silver backs, heels and anklestraps. Either green or red shades particularly a rose red, are shown in the shops.

Pleated sports skirts are made with tape loops at the sides of the belt so that they may be hung on coat hangers. This is the only correct way to hang up a pleated skirt, and since pleats play a prominent part this spring, it is a fact worth remembering.

Sleeveless pajamas of crepe de chine in pastel colors are shown for resort wear. Usually they are piped in contrasting color.

Among the dressier types of jumper dresses is one for afternoon wear; the skirt is made entirely of gray fringe, with the jumper of gray charmeuse. The fringe is very deep being joined to the skirt beneath the jumper.

GRAPEFRUIT SALAD.

Peel the grapefruit and then skin the sections very carefully so as not to break them. Lay about three of the sections on a bed of crisp lettuce in the individual salad plate, over the top sprinkle paprika and then serve with a French dressing made from the mixture of two parts olive oil to one of lemon juice, with one saltspoonful of salt to each tablespoonful of lemon juice.

COCOANUT SPONGE CAKE.

One can fresh cocoanut, 6 egg yolks, 1 cup sugar 1-2 cup boiling water, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1 1-2 cups pastry flour, 1 teaspoon flavoring. Beat egg yolks until very light. Add sugar gradually then the hot water, beating constantly. Add the flour sifted with the baking powder and beat thoroughly. Add flavoring. Bake in layers in moderate oven, 325 degrees Fahrenheit. Put together with cocoanut butter icing.

Eggs Shirred With Scallops.

Prepare 1 cup of scallops and then cook for about 10 minutes in 1 1-2 cups of cream sauce. Arrange in 5 or 6 small individual baking dishes. Break an egg in each; sprinkle with salt and pepper; add a little butter and bake until eggs are firm.

DROP COOKIES.

One half cup sugar, three eggs one cup shortening, one teaspoon each cinnamon and cloves, three cups English walnut meats, two solved in three tablespoons sour milk or one teaspoon soda and two of cream tartar in sweet milk, two cups English walnut meats, two cups raisins. Drop by spoonful in a buttered pan and bake.

BROWN BREAD.

One quart sour milk, one cup molasses, one teaspoon soda, one teaspoon baking powder, one half cup corn meal, graham flour to make it thick, little salt. Let stand fifteen minutes and bake in a moderate oven.

BRITISH BAZAARS
SELL PIPES USED
BY NOTABLES

London, May 6.—Tobacco pipes used by celebrities in England hold just as much interest for Englishmen as the "Dawes pipe" used by the American Vice-President holds for Americans. Recently one of the briars of Stanley Baldwin, Prime Minister brought £15 at a charity bazaar auction. Since then many members of the government and others of note have been besieged with requests for their discarded pipes.

Lord Eustace Percy, Minister of Education, as a rule smokes a corn cob bearing the label "Made in Missouri," with a clay pipe for a change, but when pressed to part with these for charity he declined, giving instead a pipe used near Schaum, which sold at auction for £10.
