### HERRIOT IS CENSURED BY THE COUNCIL

Ex-Premier of France May Lose His Job as Mayor.

WILL PUT UP A FIGHT  
Scored for Abandoning His Fight Against Bloc National.

Lyons, France, Sept. 7.—Edouard Herriot, twice ousted as Premier of France, may soon lose his job as Mayor of Lyons, as well.

The Socialist municipal council have paved the way for Herriot's resignation here by voting 30 to 26 to censure him for abandoning his fight against the "bloc national" and joining the Poincare Cabinet.

M. Herriot replied indicating his intention to put up a fight in an effort to obtain a majority in the municipal council and remain Mayor of his home city.

### GIRL SMOKERS IMPROVING BUSINESS

London, Sept. 7.—Heavy smoking by large numbers of London girls and women, many of whom consume a package or two of cigarettes a day, is held responsible in large measure for the fact that the authorities are being forced to add another story to the huge tobacco warehouse at the London docks. The present building, through which all imports pass, has become far too small.

Dealers about the city confirm the idea that the growing demand for tobacco on the part of the female population is one of the prime reasons why tobacco imports have grown from about 50,000 tons in 1910 to nearly 85,000 last year.

"Look at the number of girls and women who smoke nowadays and look at the amount they smoke," said the head of one of the largest retail tobacco firms. "Before the war women smoked comparatively little. Now a substantial percentage of our customers are women and girls, many of whom smoke from 10 to 20 cigarettes a day."

### MORE SHOCKS OF EARTHQUAKE IN THE AZORES

The Inhabitants of Horta Given a Bad Scare.

NO DAMAGE IS REPORTED

Business on the Island in a State of Paralysis.

(Special to the DAILY MAIL by the British United Press)

Lisbon, Sept. 7.—Renewed earthquakes caused panic among the inhabitants of Horta, the Azores, last night. There was no damage reported but the homeless refugees who suffered from last week's severe quake, in which twelve persons were killed and several hundred injured, were badly frightened.

Business was still paralyzed in the island today according to a dispatch to the Government here.

### MR. MEIGHEN FOR STABILITY OF GOVERNMENT

Brantford, Ont., Sept. 6.—Liberals as well as Conservatives should vote for the present government on the strength of its fiscal policy, Premier Meighen told audiences in this part of Ontario today.

He spoke at Niagara Falls, Paris and Brantford, stressing the issue of protection. Stability of government could not be obtained unless the Liberal-Progressive policies of the last five years are voted down, he asserted.

At Niagara Falls, the park beside the falls was thronged with a picnic crowd of 2,000 odd. On the platform with him were Conservative candidates from several surrounding constituencies, including the present minister of trade and commerce, Hon. J. D. Chaplin, who spoke briefly.

At Paris and Brantford in the evening, the prime minister described the Robb budget as a sham, especially as it dealt with automobile taxes.

### TO CELEBRATE THEIR WEDDING ANNIVERSARY

Ottawa, Sept. 6.—Rt. Hon. W. S. Fielding, D. C. L., LL. D., federal minister of finance in the late King cabinet, and Mrs. Fielding, will quietly celebrate here tomorrow the golden anniversary of their wedding. Already messages of congratulation are being received from many points in the Dominion.

The marriage of Rt. Hon. and Mrs. Fielding took place on September 7, 1876, at Saint John, N. B. The bride of 50 years ago was Miss Hester Rankin, daughter of Thomas A. Rankin. Three daughters and one son will be present for tomorrow's celebration.

### WOMEN IN MANY PROFESSIONS

Dublin, Sept. 7.—The complete equality of women and men in the Sarostat politically and educationally guaranteed by the constitution has led to the entry of women into professions hitherto confined to men. Women doctors and barristers are numerous and lately there are women stock brokers and women chartered accountants. Now the Sarostat has its first lady veterinary surgeon in Miss Woodward the daughter of a Dublin clergyman.

### The Candaiaans Will Abandon Claim for a Semi Permanent Seat

Delegation to the League of Nations Met in Secret Today—Will Reserve the Right to Put Forward a Demand in the Future—Other Dominions Not Connected by the Decision of Canadians.

(By Henry Wood, United Press Staff Correspondent).

GENEVA, Sept. 7.—The Canadian delegation to the League of Nations met secretly today and decided to temporarily abandon its claim for a semi permanent seat on the League Council.

"For the present, Canada will not press her claim to a council seat" Sir George Foster told the United Press, "although we will reserve the right to put forward such a demand in the future."

This decision, naturally, does not commit the other Dominions, which retain liberty of action. But, since Canada was considered to be the most prominent potential candidate for the council among the British dominions, her abstention from the scramble for a council seat evoked the belief that all the dominions would refrain from urging similar claims during this session. Together with Canada, it was understood heretofore that Australia might become a strong contender for a seat. The sentiment of the Dominion delegates indicated that they must be reckoned among the future claimants for direct representation in the council.

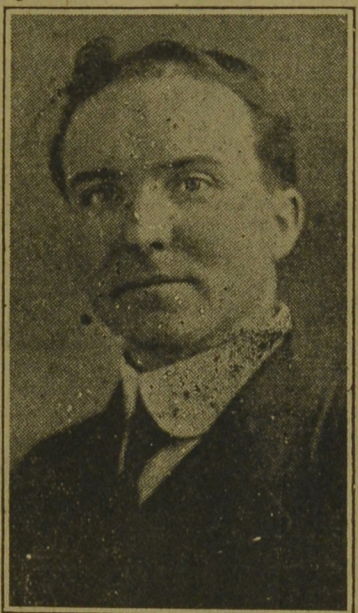

### AN ARTIFICIAL SUBSTITUTE FOR SLEEP

Ammunition Maker is Searching for an Explosive Compound.

SUGGESTS AN ANTIDOTE

Such a Discovery Would Add 50 Per Cent to Production.

(Special to the Daily Mail by the British United Press)

Philadelphia, Sept. 7.—Irene Dupont of the firm of E. I. Dupont Nemours and Company, which manufactures explosives, is searching for some chemical compound which will "explode" sleep.

In a speech here before the American Chemical Society, the manufacturer deplored that need of seven or eight hours for sleep and urged research which might find an artificial substitute.

"Would it not seem likely, he said, 'that an antidote may be prepared and administered thereby either decreasing the amount of sleep required or even doing away with the necessity of sleeping entirely.'"

"Such a discovery would add some fifty percent to both our hours of production and our hours of pleasure."

### SALT A POISON TO THE BODY AND TISSUES

Paris, Sept. 7.—Danger to the mind and the body lurks in the saltcrust. So says Dr. Jean Bouchon, an eminent French surgeon.

In an article in the Nouvelle Revue, Dr. Bouchon says salt is one of the worst of modern social poisons. Because of its surgeons constantly are operating for appendicitis, gastric ulcer and liver and renal calculus. It atrophies, dries up or harden muscular tissues and causes persons with tendencies to arthritis to become stout and those of lymphatic temperament to become thin.

According to Dr. Bouchon, salt also has an injurious effect on the intelligence.

### PARIS WOMEN HAVE NEW FAD

Paris, Sept. 7.—Luminous fingertips are the latest rage in the smart cafes of the boulevards. The finger nails are treated with a phosphorescent preparation which makes them glow. But a strong opposition has already developed on the ground that the innovation is not in good taste. It is suggested that it makes Milady's fingers look like advertisements.

The fly and leader was sent to Currie Bros. grocery store and now awaits identification. The fly proved to be a Black Dose and has a two foot leader attached to it. The tying was done in a rather crude manner and the line had become untied at the loop of the leader.

### MR. COOLIDGE GIVES DENIAL TO A REPORT

Will be No Competitive Armament Race with Europe.

U. S. FAVORS LIMITATION

Only Wants Sufficient Armaments for National Defence.

Paul Smith's, N. Y., Sept. 7.—President Coolidge has flatly denied that his spokesman had threatened Europe with a competitive armament race unless limitation treaties are entered into. Some dispatches conveying such an alleged threat have caused consternation abroad.

The President caused to be reiterated the view that this nation not only favored arms limitation by treaty, but intended to go further and voluntarily limit itself to armaments required by national defense without regard for the programme of other nations.

### SHOULD HAVE GOVERNMENT RECOGNITION

(Toronto Globe.)

The growth of tourist travel and its importance from a commercial point of view have prompted the question whether it should not be given the Government recognition which its magnitude seems to warrant by the creation of a Department to promote its interests and encourage its expansion. This is a matter which, in Ontario, is one for consideration by the authorities at Queen's Park. But it is not out of the way to draw attention to the fact that such a suggestion has been made by La Presse of Montreal to the Government of Quebec. La Presse takes the point of view that for tourist travel one supreme control is needed, and it urges that nothing be left undone to increase the flow of these visitors.

This traffic means good business, as is shown by the revenue Canada is likely, according to Washington, to obtain from it this year. The estimate made by Washington is \$190,000,000. This is a comfortable sum, and likely to increase from year to year. But beyond the monetary return, which it is inhospitable to emphasize, the value of revealing the beauty and natural wealth of the Dominion to discerning visitors cannot be overestimated.
