FIFTY LIVES LOST IN A FIRE AND STAMPEDE AT A MOVIE SHOW AT LIMERICK, IRELAND

Limerick, Ireland, Sept. 6—Fifty lives were lost and a dozen persons seriously injured Sunday night in a fire in a temporary cinema hall in the village of Drumcolleger, near here.

The moving picture show was being given in a hall over a garage in a wooden building. The hall was reached by one stairway. The projection machine caught fire and in the panic women and children were crushed and trampled in the frantic stampede to escape from the blazing hall and many were trapped to be burned alive.

The village has a poorly equipped water supply and the wooden building with the garage on the ground floor burned fiercely. It was the first time the show had been opened to the public. There had been a trial showing the night before at which everything went well. Large Audience at Show.

The village of Drumcolleger has less than 500 population but the announcement of the showing of the film, "The Decoy," attracted an audience from all the hamlets, for such a show was an unusual event in these remote villages.

The fire started within 15 minutes after the opening of the show. The projecting machine was not protected by any screen and was placed within a foot of the only door. When it caught fire it was a seething mass of flames within a moment or so and great panic seized the spectators,

who had to pass through sheets of flame from the apparatus in rushing for the door. Men, women and children were knocked down and trampled in the terrible rush.

Soon Becomes Furnace.

The wooden building soon became a furnace. Some managed to get through the one door and hurled themselves down the narrow stairway. A few active young men climbed through a skylight and escaped to safety in the neighboring yard. A portion of the floor soon collapsed, dropping part of the spectators in the garage beneath, whence it was more easy to escape. The fire burned itself out and the building was completely destroyed. Most of the bodies recovered from the ruins were burned beyond recognition. Throughout the night rescuers were engaged in the task of removing the dead. Piteous scenes were to be observed during the work, because of the distress caused.

The bodies recovered include those of 20 women, 10 men and 10 children. One family of six persons on a holiday from London perished. Some children who were thrown through the window escaped with bruises only. One young girl, after clambering through the skylight, fell from the roof and was killed. A man trying to descend from the roof by a waterspout fell and was badly injured. Both the operator of the projecting machine and the owner of the show were arrested.

SASKATCHEWAN AND ALBERTA AS PROVINCES OF CANADA HAVE ATTAINED THEIR MAJORITY

(Toronto Globe.)

Just twenty-one years ago the Provinces of Saskatchewan and Alberta came into being with resplendent inaugural ceremonies. Earl Grey then Governor-General; Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Prime Minister and a host of other notable personages journeyed from the East to witness the respective official events, at Edmonton on Sept. 1 and at Regina on Sept. 4. Both cities, now so progressive and beautiful were still in a raw, undeveloped state, with straggling business streets and muddy roads but with no end of hope and ambition. The new Provinces had been carved out of the old Northwest Territory as population and prospects warranted the autonomy granted by the Federal Parliament.

The great movement of settlers to the rich, vacant prairies had already set in, and trainloads of immigrants were of almost daily occurrence. Earl Grey in his address at Edmonton made happy reference to this fact when he said:

"You are justified in anticipating a steady flow of intending settlers into your Province, for many who seek to better their conditions both in the New World and the Old, are already counting the hours until they can embrace with both hands the riches you are able to offer them out of your abundant treasury."

Sir Wilfrid Laurier was not unmindful of the uncertainties which might follow the incoming of so many people from other lands. He invited the newcomers to share fully in our laws and our civilization. He added:

"We do not anticipate, and we do not want that any individuals should forget the land of their origin or their ancestors. Let them look to the past, but let them look also to the future; let them look to the land of their ancestors, but let them also look to the land of their children. Let them become Canadians, British subjects and give their heart and soul, their energy, their vows to Canada to its institutions to its King, who, like his illustrious mother, is a model constitutional Sovereign."

MAKING WAR ON ENEMIES OF THE SALMON

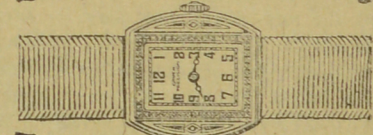

by his dog they coughed up a number of salmon parr four inches in length which is tangible proof that they feed upon the offspring of the greatest game fish which New Brunswick possesses.

On Monday morning Mr. Currie took another trip around the islands near the salmon pool and while he found the ducks a little more shy than on the first occasion he succeeded in knocking over three more, making a total of eight in two days. The shell ducks are now nearly full grown, and it is estimated that each one can devour at least thirty salmon parr a day, so it will be seen that in the run of a season a flock of them are capable of doing a lot of injury to salmon which if protected would in the course of three years be big enough to take a fly.

Hon. Mr. Richards is the first Minister of Lands and Mines in the history of the province who has interested himself in this matter and he is certainly deserving of the thanks of all disciples of Isaak Walton as well as the net fishermen of the Saint John and Miramichi for the practical interest he is taking on the preservation of one of New Brunswick's most valuable assets.
