

# RIPPLES MAN PINNED BENEATH OVERTURNED CAR

Robert Lonergan Escaped Serious Injury at Barker's Point—Truck Smashed Car Here Monday.

Robert Lonergan of Ripples who was in a car with Percy Flowers of the same place had a narrow escape from serious injury or death at two o'clock this morning at Barker's Point. The car was crowded off the road at a sharp turn in the road and overturned. Before he could be extricated from the position in which he was pinned beneath the car, Lonergan was soaked by gasoline and hot water from the radiator. He was brought to Fredericton where his injuries were attended.

Dr. R. H. McGrath attended the injured man at John Colwell's King street, and found the injuries not serious.

The overturning of the car is said to have been caused by a wheel striking a shingle-bolt on the edge of the road.

## Truck Smashed Small Car

The crash occurred at the intersection of Charlotte and York streets.

# BOYS STOLE BOTTLES TO SELL TO OTHERS

Break at Randolph's Warehouse Results in Arrest of Two — To Appear on Tuesday of Next Week.

Two boys aged about twelve years of age were arrested on Labor Day charged with breaking into the warehouse of A. F. Randolph & Sons, Limited, on the wharf behind the Normal School building. The break was made for the purpose of stealing bottles which were sold in other places.

Thefts of this kind had been going on for some time and the police were notified. On Monday they suspected that the boys were at it and caught them in the act. They were put in the cells and were very tearful while there.

This morning the youngsters appeared in Juvenile Court before Sitting Magistrate MacKay and were let go on condition that they appear next Tuesday for hearing.

The youngsters are believed to belong to a gang of boys which has been under suspicion for some time.

## Fumigation Caused Alarm.

An alarm of fire was rung in Saturday night from box 24 at the intersection of Westmorland and Queen streets. Premises in the building owned by the Calder Estate were being fumigated after illness and passersby seeing flashes of light concluded that a fire had started.

# MAKING WAR ON ENEMIES OF THE SALMON

Hon. Mr. Richards Secures Permits for the Destruction of Merganser Ducks — Good Results Already.

Hon. C. D. Richards, Minister of Lands and Mines, has inaugurated a campaign against the merganser or shell duck, the destructive pest which annually devours thousands of young salmon on the Saint John, Miramichi and other rivers of the province. This matter was brought to the attention of the Minister in April last by the York-Sunbury branch of the New Brunswick Fish and Game Protective Association and on satisfying himself that these ducks were destroying the young of salmon and trout he promised to do all in his power to assist in abetting the nuisance. The merganser duck, although a voracious fish eater and absolutely unfit for food, is protected by the Migratory Birds Treaty, and it was necessary for the Minister to move cautiously in the matter. He has had voluminous correspondence with the Department of the Interior at Ottawa, and has had to overcome considerable red tape, but at last he has succeeded in obtaining a number of permits for the destruction of these pests in close season. These permits have been distributed among game wardens, fishery guardians and others along the Saint John and Miramichi Rivers. Among those listed is Mr. Raymond M. Currie of this city, who has done much to bring the angling possibilities of the Saint John river to the notice of non-residents. Mr. Currie received his permit on Saturday morning and in company with two friends set out for the Hart's Island salmon pool. In less than an hour he was on the trail of a flock of shell ducks, and succeeded in knocking down five of them in a single volley from his fowling piece. While the birds were being retrieved

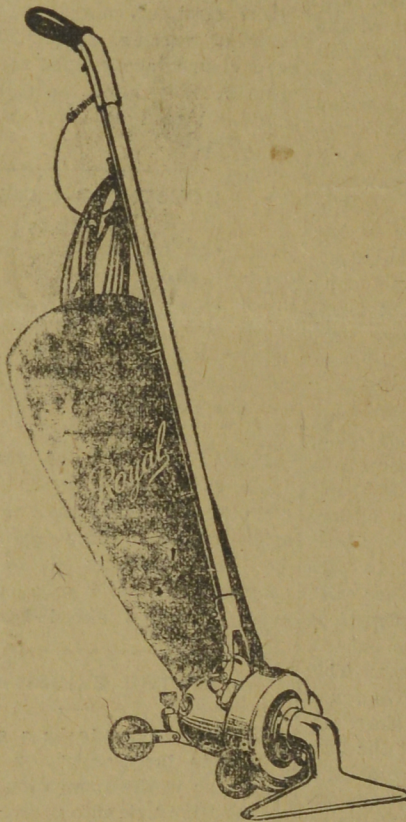
