WOULD EXCHANGE GOVERNORS.

A novel suggestion was made recently by the Right Hon. George P. Graham for promoting harmony and good feeling between the different sections of the Dominion. In an address to a Masonic gathering at Toronto, the former Minister of Railways said:

I would suggest that the Government, in order to let leading men from different Provinces get acquainted with each other, have Lieutenant-Governors provincially interchangeable, or, in other words, have the Lieutenant Governor for one Province selected from another Province. I would have the Lieutenant-Governor of Quebec chosen from Toronto, or vice versa. I would take a man from the Prairie Provinces and put him in Nova Scotia; likewise one from New Brunswick would be sent to British Columbia. I would make any man ineligible for appointment as Lieutenant-Governor in his own Province. That would be an intimation that this country was all one, and it would have a tendency to lessen the spirit of provincialism that seems to be abroad in this country. Further than that, I would ask the different Provinces to establish a round-table conference for all Canada. I would not have the members of Government in these conferences, and probably it would be as well not to have members of Parliament.

While Hon. Mr. Graham's scheme is rather fantastic it is doubtful if it would work out just right in practice. It might be pointed out, however, that in the early days of Confederation Eastern men served as Lieutenant-Governors of the Western provinces and invariably gave satisfaction.

SO THIS IS AUTUMN.

Autumn wins you best by this, its mute
Appeal to sympathy for its decay.

When Browning wrote those lines the season must have been far advanced. There are not many signs of decay in this region, now. The leaves are falling, yes; but they are mostly green. The golden glory of autumn, with the billowy bronze and velvet azure of the skies above the royal robe of oak and maple, bespeak the closing hour of nature's teeming life, and the silent farewell to humanity's gauze underwear.

It is not even as bad as that yet. True, as the almanac says, the sun's centre has crossed the celestial equator. That much must be admitted, but if there was any jolt at the crossing it was not felt hereabout.

QUITTING THE JOB.

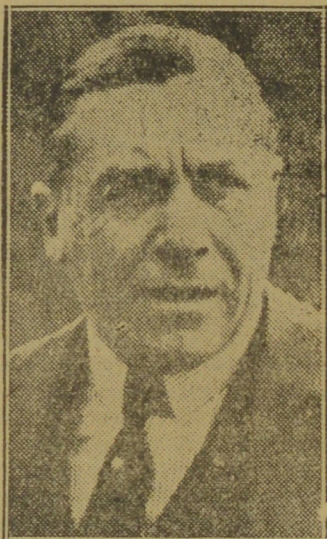

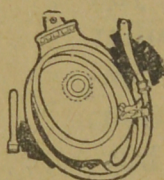
