PLYE'S TENNIS CIRCUS TO WINTER IN FLORIDA

To Practice Under Kleig Lights — Almost as Good as Natural Sunlight — Storm Damage Repaired.

New York, Oct. 6—C. C. Pyle and his golden chain of tennis players have planned an extensive tour over the courts along the East Coast of Florida this winter, according to W. H. Pickens, his representative. Suzanne Lenglen, Mary K. Browne, Vincent Richards, Paul Feret, Harvey Snodgrass, Howard Kinsey and several others will make the trip.

They plan to play at Jacksonville, St. Augustine, Ormond Beach, Palm Beach and Miami during January. The tennis courts at St. Augustine, Ormond Beach and Miami will be in excellent shape before the resort season gets under way, says the Florida East Coast Hotel Company. Men are at work repairing both golf links and tennis courts at Palm Beach and Miami, which were in last month's storm area.

Following a luncheon with Georges Carpentier, a school days friend, Jack Dempsey and his wife, Estelle Taylor, Mlle Suzanne Lenglen engaged in the first practice she has had since leaving Paris two weeks ago. She was the guest of Dr. Horace Ayres of Richmond Hill at a private court.

Paul Feret accompanied Mlle Lenglen and displayed considerable skill during the practice session. He will play against Vincent Richards in Madison Square Garden Saturday and Sunday nights.

The members of the Pyle entourage now in New York will gather in the Garden for their first practice under the brilliant glare of a set of motion picture Kleig lights installed today. Lighting specialists declare the artificial light will be almost as efficient as natural sunlight.

Babe Ruth Hero of Fourth Game of Series, Hit Three Home Runs; Yankees Won

Game at St. Louis Full of Good and Bad Baseball — Ruth's Slugging the Feature — Even St. Louis Fans Cheered Him — Teams Now Even.

St. Louis, Oct. 6—Babe Ruth led the Yankees out of the Missouri woods today with the greatest exhibition of home-run hitting any world's series has ever seen.

Three battering-ram blows from the Babe's mighty bludgeon cleared all barriers and set fire to a Yankee attack that crushed the Cardinals by a score of 10 to 5 in the fourth game of the world's championship baseball battle. As a result the series is deadlocked again at two victories apiece, with the fifth game here tomorrow.

Today was a field day for Ruth, the greatest he has ever had in world's series competition and one of the most spectacular of his walloping career. His three terrific homers not only lifted the Yankees out of their hitting slump, but figured in the shattering of seven world's series records.

Another record crowd for Sportsman's Park, a jam that numbered 38,825 and broke yesterday's mark, came in the expectation of seeing the Cardinals continue their winning streak. Instead they saw Ruth lead an onslaught that started in the first inning and continued unabated through hectic fray in which five Cardinal pitchers paraded to the mound. They saw a game of freak plays, filled with good and bad baseball, but most of all they saw the Babe at the peak of his glory. At the finish the Cardinal rooters had become so aroused that they yelled for Ruth to make a fourth homer when he came to the bat in the eighth, and booed Hallahan, St. Louis pitcher, when the latter walked the Yankee slugger.

WANDERERS MUST IMPROVE SAYS J. W. POWER

Veteran Sport Writer of Halifax Sizes Up the Club Team on its First Appearance.

James W. Power of the Acadian Recorder, veteran sport writer sizes the Wanderers up as follows:—

The Wanderers, who had most of their players of last year, were superior to the Services, and it was seldom that their opponents got into their territory, but they were below championship form, and the amount of fumbling they did would not be expected of a second team. Of course it was the first game of the season, and they did not have too formidable opponents, which may account for many of their misplays. Their passing was good but not too accurate, and they should take advantage of their opportunities in practice and adopt systematic play if they are looking for Maritime championship honors. The Services have a number of excellent individual players, but they lacked condition, and with the improvement they showed at times in the second half, illustrated that practice will make them more formidable in future games.

The Services introduced a novelty in English Rugby in having their players numbered, and such might be adopted by the League if they will arrange to have score cards sold, as it enables the onlookers to decide who the players are.

Ritchie MacCoy was once more the star of the Wanderers, making some outstanding plays, but he indulged in fumbling as well as some of the others. "Bobby" MacCoy and Hunter were just as prominent as ever, though the latter found the leather hard to handle, and the team has been strengthened by Don. McInnes, whose runs made great gains for the Wanderers. Young played just as well as last year, even if he did allow the ball to slip from his grasp near the line when he had a sure try. Shaw and Thompson played well, while the forwards worked hard and though the Services held them at times in the first half they improved in the second and showed they will be a strong combination. Logan broke away on several occasions for gains, while "Tiny" Herman was almost sensational with the runs he made. Cameron, of the forwards, scored the first try of the season. Pearson McCurdy had little chances at full with the game so one-sided, but he got in a couple of long punts.
