INDIFFERENT TO
POLITICTS ALSO

Two Parishes Fail to
to Nominate for Mu-
nicipal Byelection —
Situation Reported to
the Warden.

The indifference to municipal politics which appeared in New Maryland Parish where no nomination was made to fill a vacancy in the York Municipal Council, also has appeared in Prince William Parish where a like situation has arisen. There the vacancy was made by the death of Coun. C. W. Pond. In New Maryland Coun. Frank Smith resigned upon removal from the county.

Will Have to Send For One.
O. B. Morris, Parish Clerk of Prince William, reported the lack of candidates to County Secretary J. S. Scott concluding his letter with the sentence, "I guess we will have to send to T. Eaton for one".

Reported to the Warden.

The County Secretary has reported to Warden Cowperthwaite the failure of either parish to secure a candidate. The Warden probably will appoint another date for the by-election and the machinery will be set in motion again, to hold election. Six days must elapse between nomination and election day. The situation never has arisen before in the history of York County. Two elections by acclamation have been allowed to slip away.

Generally Fighting Ground.

The failure to nominate in Prince William has occasioned more comment than the same in New Maryland as in the past Prince William has been excellent fighting ground with numerous candidates and keen spirit in the contests. New Maryland has had many elections without contests.

It is expected that attention will be directed to the matter in the two parishes when the next date is set.

Saint John Times-Star: Dr. William McIntosh, curator of the Museum of Natural History here, is a member of the committee of the American Ornithologists' Union which is making arrangements for the meeting to be held this year at Ottawa from October 11 to 14, but will not be able to attend owing to press of business here. BROADCASTING
SPRUCE SEED
BRINGS RESULTS

Seedlings From Mavis
Mills Forwarded to
Department of Lands
and Mines — Well
Grown.

A small box of white spruce seedlings has been forwarded to the Department of Lands and Mines from Mavis Mills, York County for the purpose of showing the growth attained in less than a year from seed. The seedlings were of excellent growth and were budded for the second year's growth.

Broadcasted Last Autumn.

The seed from which the seedlings grew was broadcasted last autumn in old roads and trails about Mavis Mills, J. C. Veness of the Federal Forest Service doing the planting. The experiment was made to see what growth could be obtained from broadcast sowing on ground which had no preparation the conditions being approximately what Nature provides. The result has been heavy reproduction of the white spruce where sown. The indications point to ready reafforestation in New Brunswick by broadcast sowing or by natural reproduction.

Also at Nursery.

At the Forest Nursery in University Avenue where cooperative effort of the Forest Service of the Province and the Forest School of the University of New Brunswick, conducts experiments, seedlings have been produced in various varieties of trees with marked success. Reafforestation could be carried on with ease in this country.

Ill-Treated a Horse.

Saint John Globe: James J. Merryfield, city and provincial constable, was fined \$5 by Police Magistrate Henderson, this morning, when he was adjudged guilty of a report made by Police Constable VanWart, that he ill-treated a horse on the East Side Ferry floats on Saturday. He was defended by Frank Frauley, and J. King Kelley, K. C., appeared for the S. P. C. The magistrate reviewed the facts of the case and said he took into consideration the defendant's physical condition and would therefore impose only a light penalty. Institution.


