## STRONG N.S. TECH TEAM TACKLED BY U.N.B. SQUAD

Red and Black Left for  
Sackville Today  
Lieut. Comr. Murray  
to Referee Tomorrow.

The University of New Brunswick rugby football squad left this morning for Sackville and will play Nova Scotia Technical College on the Mt. Allison campus Friday afternoon for the Maritime Intercollegiate title.

President Boyle of the Intercollegiate Conference to whom the matter of referee was suggested named Lieut. Commander Murray of Halifax as referee and each college accepted him.

Two Reserves Carried.

The U. N. B. team is to be the same as that which played in the last two games;—fullback, Holmes; three-quarters, Doddridge, Steen, Chestnut, Goodspeed; halves, Hickson, Currie, Donohoe (capt.); forwards, Woods, Petrie, Pierson, Dalzell, Macaulay, MacMurray, McLennahan; reserve forward, Stratton; reserve utility player, Fowler.

Substitution is allowed up to two men, in case of actual injury.

Burden Not With Team.

C. B. Burden coach will not be able to accompany the team. J. F. McCarthy the Mt. Allison coach will perform whatever services are considered necessary.

Dr. A. F. VanWart had been requested to accompany the U. N. B. team but was unable to as he intends to go to Montreal to see Toronto Varsity play McGill Saturday in the first game of the two to break the tie in the Canadian Intercollegiate League among the "Big Three."

Tech Strong Team.

Nova Scotia Tech is accounted a strong team particularly forward. The U. N. B. backs are accounted superior. Lieut. Commander Murray refereed both games that St. F. X. played in the Eastern Section and is counted a man able to take and keep control of a game.

## Nova Scotia Tech Rugby Squad Contains Players Of Ability and Promise

Two of Wanderers' Forwards Among Them—  
Other Players Come From Several Well  
Known Maritime Colleges—Thumbnail  
Sketches.

Nova Scotia Technical College winners of the Eastern Maritime Intercollegiate Rugby Section, faces University of New Brunswick Western Section winners at Sackville Friday afternoon. In its section Tech beat King's at Halifax 14 to 0 and St. Francis Xavier 6 to 0 at Antigonish. It is only fair to say that a severe penalty for scrapping forced St. F. X. to play a man short almost the entire game.

The Halifax Chronicle publishes the following on the team and gives thumbnail sketches of the players.

Nova Scotia Technical College Rugby team has been showing great promise during the past few years. With a student body small in numbers they have been putting on the field a Rugby team which would be a credit to a college twice or even three times as large.

Their record last year was a very good one and they made an excellent showing against the famous University of New Brunswick fifteen, last year's winners of the McTier Trophy in their game with them at Sackville. Last year Tech defeated St. F. X. in an intercollegiate fixture by the score of 7-3. Later they defeated Kings 24-0. In the game with U. N. B., although they gave a very creditable account of themselves, the locals lost to the tune of 14-3.

"John" Clancy plays front line scrum. He is an old St. F. X. man, having played football with the Antigonish boys in 1924 and hockey with them in 1925. In hockey his position is on the defence. Last year he was a member of the Tech football and hockey squads and also played football with the Wanderers. Weight, 190 lbs.

Jack Horne plays on the three-quarter line. He has played Rugby for the Halifax County Academy and two years ago was a member of the Y. M. C. A. soccer team. He has been a member of St. George's basketball team for three years. He has a most potent

kick and is a decided asset to the team. Weight, 165 lbs.

"Art" Hewatt is also on the three-quarter line. Last year he played football with the Tech team and plays a good game. He was also a member of the Wanderers basketball team last year. Weight, 150 lbs.

"Free" Freeman hails from the cider town—Bridgetown. He plays on the forward line. Has been a member of the Acadia Rugby squad and last year he played with Tech for the first time. In the intercollegiate track meet he excelled in the field sports.

"Jim" Crombie plays fullback and is a very promising man. He has played football in Upper Canada and played hockey and basketball with McGill teams. He is a good punter with either foot and is an accurate tackler. Weight, 150 lbs.

"Turk" McKenzie plays on the forward line. He is an old Mount Allison man, having played football and basketball with the Sackville collegians. While attending the New Brunswick college he also was a member of the track team. In 1925 he was manager of the Mount Allison football team. He attended Tech for the first time last year and played with the senior Engineer team. Last year he also played basketball with the Wanderers. Weight, 170 lbs.

"Abe" Morrison plays on the three-quarter line. He is an old King's man, having played football and hockey with teams representing the University during the last few years. He was captain of the King's football team in 1924. For the past two years he has been playing both football and hockey for Tech and he is captain of the hockey team for the coming season. Weight, 165 lbs.

He excelled in sprinting. Last year was his first appearance at Tech and he made the senior rugby team. He plays on the three-quarter line and weighs 145 lbs.

"Fred" Tuttle is a former Mount Allison man where he played football for two years. Last year he played football with the Tech and Wanderers teams. His position is in the forward line and he is a good doubler. Weight, 170 lbs.

George Dike played football for Kings two years before entering Tech. Last year he played with Tech and the Wanderers. This year he is centre back with the senior engineers. Weight, 170 lbs.

Hawley Morrison, otherwise known as "Tud" hails from Amherst. He is one of the best all round athletes at Tech, and is very popular. Morrison played football two years at Acadia and for the last two years played with Tech. He was a member of the Acadia hockey team in 1922-1923, and was one of the best men in the intercollegiate league. He has played hockey for Tech and the Crescents. While at Acadia Morrison was also a member of the intercollegiate track team. He has a most enviable record in intercollegiate athletic circles. Weight, 150 lbs.

"Min" Moore is fast, a good tackler, and makes several runs for gains during his games and is a close rival of his brother, the star fullback with the Dalhousie Tigers. "Min" has played football in Upper Canada and has also played hockey with McGill while a student at the Montreal University. He has played both hockey and football at Kings. Last year he was a member of Tech and Wanderers teams in the Rugby League and this year is again
