PALE EGGS FOR PALE PEOPLE IS NEW CALIFORNIA SLOGAN

San Francisco, Nov. 17.—Pale eggs for pale people seems to be the new slogan of the expanding California poultry industry. It has been discovered that residents of Eastern cities, who consume a large portion of the output of poultry ranches of northern and southern California, want the yolks of their morning hen fruit to be pale yellow, and at once a big effort is on to train biddy to lay 'em that way.

Just why an "Easter" would rather face a couple of fried ones with faded centers when he has his morning coffee the poultry raiser can't figure, and he isn't wasting much time trying to. It suffices that a bright orange yolk doesn't get a good reception and a perfectly fresh egg, if the middle inclines toward a brick red or a dark shade, arouses suspicion. An expert whose business it is to advise poultry men of this State how to produce eggs for profit suggests that "gentlemen prefer blondes," and biddie's keeper might as well face the fact.

New York is Blamed.

This expert blames the New Yorker for disliking the rich color nature long ago decided upon and residents of other Eastern cities for following styles set in Gotham.

So now experts of the State University, State and national departments of agriculture and poultry associations are telling egg producers big and little, how to persuade the already highly specialized egg layer to forego natural inclinations and produce a color that will leave a good taste in the New Yorker's mouth.

The modern prima donna of the hen roost is fed more carefully than a modern baby "brought up by the book." A delicately balanced ration, with just the proper amount of starches, carbohydrates and vitamins, oh, by all means, vitamins!—are fed by the veriest tyro who has just moved from a city apartment to a two acre "ranch." The vitamins hitherto have been supplied by greens and yellow corn from the middle West.

New Source Found.

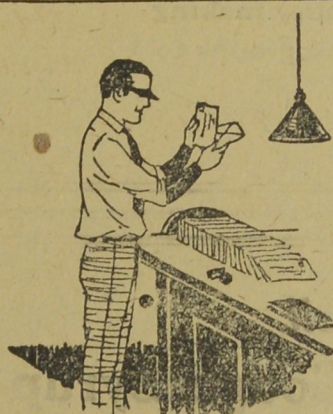
Now an expert has discovered that the vitamins can be supplied as well by alfalfa hay and white corn and that such a combination will cause biddy to lay an egg of just the shade of yellow that will tempt even a jaded New Yorker's appetite. That's a discovery of importance to the egg-producing industry, and it's also revolutionary but a few credulous ones are trying it.

Miss Sylvia L. Parker, University of California expert, who has broken some twenty thousand eggs to find out what they are like inside and out is working out color charts which will make it possible for California to cater to this modern taste in colors. Miss Parker formerly was near the campus in Berkeley but a controversy of several years was won by irate residents of the college town, who strenuously and successfully objected to be awakened by the university's early rising chickens, even if it did mean that the Eastern breakfaster would ultimately get eggs with the pale yolk.

Of Interest to the Women

PROPER CARE OF LINEN INSURES ITS LIFE AND BEAUTY.

The life time of linen damask is indeterminate, provided it is given a reasonable amount of care, but for the preservation of its patterns and the satiny smoothness of its texture and the freshness of its appearance on the dining table there are a few rules that should be observed.

Table linen that is not to be used immediately should never be laundered with starching. It should be placed in an airy closet and wrapped in blue paper. The blue paper will prevent its turning yellow.

The smallest holes in linen should be promptly repaired and all stains be removed before washing. When chemical eradicators are used in removing the stains the traces of eradicant should be removed before laundering.

With linen that is in every day use it is well to place the most recently laundered pieces at the bottom of the pile so that all the pieces in use will receive an equal amount of wear.

To preserve the beauty of linen the creases should be accurately folded in a straight line. Linen should be washed in pure soap, dried in the sun and ironed while still damp. The design in the linen is more clearly brought out when it is ironed while damp.

COMMON SENSE IN THE HOUSEHOLD.

A springlike scent of violets will perfume the handkerchiefs even in the winter months, if orris root is tied in a muslin bag and placed in the water in which the handkerchiefs are washed.

Plants growing in the house may be kept in shape by pinching the end buds of the shoots that grow too vigorously.

Dishes that are to be frozen need an extra amount of sweetening.

Rinse milky glasses in cold water before washing in warm water to prevent them from looking cloudy.

A glossy finish to enameled beds is gained by putting a little turpentine on a soft cloth and rubbing the metal with it.

BAKED MACARONI AND CHEESE.

In casserole put layer macaroni, broken in one inch pieces and which has been cooked in salted boiling water, then layer cheese, etc., until dish is full; cheese, etc., until dish is full; cheese being last layer. Nearly fill casserole with milk, cover top with crumbs and dot with bits of butter. Bake delicate brown.

CREAMED CAULIFLOWER.

Take off outer stalks, soak about half an hour in cold salted water, head down. Put into boiling water with little salt and cook about one hour. Drain and pour following cream over it. Put into small sauce pan one tablespoon butter and one of flour. Mix well and add one well beaten egg. Then add half cup milk and same of water. Cook until thick. The egg may be omitted.

MEAT CASSEROLE.

A delicious casserole dish, either for luncheon or dinner, may be made of last night's roast of beef, veal, lamb or pork. Use two cups cooked chopped meat, one half cup of chopped onion, one can of tomatoes, one can spaghetti, one cup cracker crumbs, salt and pepper to taste. Lay the meat, onions, tomatoes and other ingredients in a baking dish in layers. Bake the dish one hour at a low temperature, about 300 degrees.

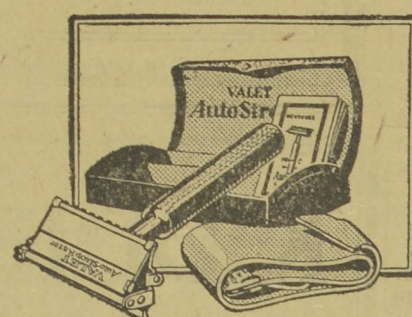
