SALMON FILMS
FOR NEW YORK

Chief Game Warden is Leaving Tonight to Attend North America Fish & Game Protective Association.

The salmon angling on the Restigouche River will be advertised by Chief Game Warden L. A. Gagnon at the meeting of the North America Fish & Game Protective Association to be held in New York next week. The Chief Warden will leave for New York tonight taking with him three films which were taken on the Restigouche last summer and which show the salmon angling and its attendant sport in great detail.

Private Exhibition Here. There was a private exhibition of the films at the Gaiety Theatre here Thursday afternoon which was witnessed by Hon. C. D. Richards, Minister of Lands and Mines, G. H. Prince the Deputy Minister, and the Chief Warden. The pictures were excellent.

Taken by Dominion Photographers. The pictures were filmed last summer by photographers sent here by the Dominion Department of the Interior. Chief Warden Gagnon accompanied them on their trip on the Restigouche.

Publicity Needed.

The chief reason why the pictures are to be shown at New York is to show American sportsmen the class of angling the streams of New Brunswick can afford and to interest them in the sale of angling licenses on the Restigouche which will take place at the Crown Land Office in March next. The leases are for five years and are valuable. Some are now held by Americans.

CITY AFFAIRS

Some Late Honkers. Several large flocks of wild geese issued over the city yesterday afternoon on their way to the south.

To Winter in West Indies. Mrs. C. E. Neill of Montreal left Thursday for New York, and will spend a fortnight there before sailing for Nassau, B. W. I., where she will remain for the winter.

Special Train Service. A request for the usual special train service for Fredericton and surrounding country during the Christmas season, will be requested by the Transportation Committee of the Board of Trade.

Alarm of Fire Last Night. An alarm of fire was rung in from box 43 last night between nine and ten o'clock. The cause was a burning chimney at the home of Dell Munro, Saint John street.

Woodstock Train Derailment. Thursday night a car which was derailed at a siding on the Gibson Branch of the C. P. R. some six miles from North Devon, blocked the line for a time. The car was replaced on the line and traffic restored. The train from Woodstock was delayed for some time.

Fire Losses Lower. The loss to property by fire in New Brunswick during the 11 months of this year was reported upon and was placed at about \$200,000 less than for the first 11 months of 1925, and the insurance loss about \$160,000 lower than during the corresponding period last year.

Gets Promotion. Paul Currie, son of Mr. Raymond Currie of this city, who shipped some time ago on the Imperial Oil Steamer Torontolite has returned to Halifax from a voyage to Levis, Quebec. In a recent letter to his parents he states that he has been given the post of quartermaster. He expects to leave shortly on an extended trip to Southern Waters.

The Three Tree Creek Fire. The New Brunswick Fire Prevention Board, at its monthly meeting at Saint John yesterday afternoon, had under consideration the recent fire at Three Tree Creek, which a young man is alleged to have confessed to setting. The matter was thoroughly gone into, but the decision arrived at was not announced.

EVIDENCE IN
MISSING WILL
CASE TAKEN

Another Witness is Required—Court Likely to Accept Copy of the Robinson Will for Proof.

Four witnesses appeared before Judge H. G. Fenety of the York County Probate Court Thursday afternoon in the matter of the estate of the late Mrs. Mary Hyde Robinson, proof of whose will is desired. Their evidence was accepted by the court which also desired to hear that of Mrs. Agnew with whom the testatrix was making her home at the time of her death. Ad-journment was made for the purpose of arranging to have Mrs. Agnew give evidence.

The hearing before Judge Fenety was held because of the loss of the original will drawn up by C. R. Hawkins solicitor for the testatrix. After her death it was found that the envelope in the safety deposit box at the bank contained only the copy of the will and not the original. It is desired that the copy be proven in absence of the original.

C. R. Hawkins on behalf of Dr. S. F. A. Wainwright, executor of the estate, presented a petition for letters testamentary. It was set out that the estate was valued between \$8,000 and \$8,500, all personal property.

Mr. Hawkins stated that there had been a will but that it was impossible to find it and asked permission of the court to prove the same by secondary evidence and production of a copy.

Witnesses Heard

Witnesses then were called to prove the existence to the original will. They were Dr. S. F. A. Wainwright, C. R. Hawkins, Mrs. Theodore Roberts, Mrs. Barnett with whom the testatrix boarded at the time the will was drawn.

After the evidence of Mrs. Agnew the court if satisfied that the circumstances are as set forth, will likely grant permission to prove the copy of the will.

PROPOSED TO
HAVE DOMINION
HOME UNDER FUND

Demands on Canteen Fund are Increasing Steadily — Interest Will be Overtaken Shortly.

The advisability of establishing a Dominion Home for the reception and treatment of cases now cared for under the Canteen Fund of the Canadian Expeditionary Force, instead of the continuation of the present system of caring for cases out of the interest accumulating from the fund of two million dollars available in Canada, is being debated.

Heavy Demands.

The New Brunswick Canteen Fund Committee was in session in Saint John yesterday, Major J. S. Scott of this city being one of those present. Payments of \$700 for the month were ordered. Applications for assistance are received at the rate of fifty per month and the demands on the Fund are increasing steadily. At present thirty-five cases in the province are being cared for by the Fund. Twenty-one are soldiers' widows. The balance are men whose trouble has developed since their discharge from service. None of these cases comes under the D. S. C. R. although the latter organization aids in the matter of investigation.

Suggestion Made.

The opinion was expressed that better results could be obtained by establishing a Dominion Home in which cases could be given attention, rather than use the interest as at present. The chief argument is that the increasing demands will shortly overtake the interest accumulation.
