THE BY-ELECTION CAMPAIGN IN WEST MIDDLESEX, ONTARIO HAS A WHIRLWIND FINISH

Glencoe, Ont., March 28—"The Government is in office. It has a majority in the house of commons. Whether Mr. J. C. Elliott is re-elected or not we are going to carry on. It remains for the electors of this riding to say whether or not they are going to have their member in the cabinet."

In his by-election speeches in West Middlesex, Saturday, Premier Mackenzie King made this announcement at several meetings.

In another place, Mr. King said: "When the next general election is coming none of us can say at present. Some of our Conservative friends say it will be soon. Others think not so soon." So far as he was concerned, added the premier, he intended to carry on until he was defeated in the house.

At a dozen Liberal meetings in the constituency on the last day of the campaign, Mr. King and five of his ministers spoke in a tour of the riding, afternoon and evening for the candidature of Hon. J. C. Elliott, newly appointed Minister of Labor, who resigned his seat in the House recently to ask his constituents to confirm his appointment. The desirability of having Ontario represented on the treasury benches of the House of Commons was one of the first considerations urged upon the electors.

Wants Ontario Minister.

"I want to have this Province of Ontario represented in the cabinet, and it is for you to say whether it is in the interests of the province or not," said Premier King. "It is a big responsibility for you. Ontario has already one cabinet minister in the senate. But except in so far as I am provided to speak for the province I belong to, even if I don't sit for it, the ministers who sit in the House do not include in their number one Ontario member. It remains for the people of West Middlesex to speak for all Ontario as to the desirability of this province being represented in the cabinet councils, where policy is initiated and measures decided on."

Elliott Also Speaks.

Premier King spoke at Parkhill in the afternoon, where an overflow gathering compelled his making two speeches. At Glencoe, the home town of Hon. J. C. Elliott, the new minister of labor, and the Premier spoke at length, winding up the former's campaign. Mr. Elliott also addressed a meeting at Newbury last evening.

During the afternoon and evening other cabinet ministers spoke at different points. Hon. Ernest Lapointe at Strathroy and Ailsa Craig; Hon. C. A. Stewart at Wardsville and Adelaide; Hon. W. H. Motherwell, at Coldstream and Mount Brydges, and Hon. C. A. Dunning at Melbourne and Delaware, supported J. C. Elliott's candidature. In addition half a dozen Liberal private members of parliament including several Western Canada, spoke on the same platform. James Malcolm, M. P., for North Bruce (who is spoken of as the next appointee to the federal cabinet, spoke at St. Rathroy and Ailsa Craig.

Speaking at Parkhill the Premier said that when he called an election last autumn it was his hope and expectation that he would be returned with a majority.

Had Taken Stock.

After the election he had taken stock of his situation to see what advice he could give the Government. He had believed that Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen would have been able to obtain a majority in the House, Premier King said, he would have been ready to recommend that Mr. Meighen be called on to form a government, but he was certain that a Conservative government would have been defeated in the House.

The number of members who differed from Mr. Meighen on tariff matters was greater than the number of his followers, the Premier declared. Mr. Meighen had promised in every district he spoke in higher tariffs on whatever was the product of this district. He had not said what would be the effect on the average home of an increased cost of living or whether he would really have dared to put up the tariff very much. The result of the election, Mr. King believed, was a vote against an increase of the tariff at the present time, and consequently he could not recommend that a Conservative government be formed.

Object of By-election.

The premier had promised the governor-general that he would do nothing in matters of policy until the house had expressed its attitude to his continuance in office. This by-election, he said, was a means of asking the electors of West Middlesex on behalf

of the rest of Canada to say if they approved of that kind of a course on the part of a public man.

Mr. Meighen had in 1921, said Mr. King, appointed a member of parliament to a government position in order to create a vacancy for himself even though he had been defeated and his party reduced to the third in numerical strength. Although the Conservative leader was not confirmed in office by the electors he had, he said, to use his power to further his personal ends and ambitions. Mr. Meighen sat through the last parliament as the embodiment of usurpation, exclaimed Mr. King.

His election in Prince Albert and Mr. Dunning's election in Regina justified him in his opinion of reorganization of his cabinet. Prince Albert and Regina could elect new men. Mr. King thought that West Middlesex would re-elect the member to whom they had recently given such a big majority. Mr. King said he did not know why a by-election was necessary. In party politics it seemed as if there was always a few men who tried to make things as difficult as possible for public men to carry on.

He deplored the charges which had been made against Mr. Elliott but he felt sure that these would make no difference to the result of the by-election.

HON. W. E. FOSTER ON MARITIME COMMISSION

The Nova Scotia Government is at the present preparing its case and it

is presumed that the Governments of New Brunswick and P. E. I. will take immediate action to get ready their cases for the commission.

Outlined in Speech.

The work which this Royal Commission is to do was outlined in the Speech from the Throne made public at the opening of Parliament on January 8, last.

The paragraph in the Speech relating to the Maritime Provinces was as follows:

"With a view to affording such remedies as may be practical and appropriate, the Government proposes to appoint a Royal Commission to inquire fully into the claims that the rights of the Maritime Provinces, in regard to the operation of the Intercolonial Railway, have not been observed, and that in regard to transportation, immigration and other economic factors, these provinces have suffered prejudicially in their position under Confederation."

The mandate given this Royal Commission was in addition to the Government's action in referring to the Railway Commission the whole question of the diversion of traffic from Canadian to American ports.

SOME VALUABLE THOROUGHBREDS WERE DESTROYED

Calgary, Alb., March 28—Fourteen valuable thoroughbred race horses were burned to death and two others were killed by a Canadian Pacific train after escaping from the burning barn when fire completely destroyed barn No. 43 at Victoria Park at 2 o'clock Sunday morning. Twelve of the horses were owned by Robert Emmert of Winnipeg, and the rest locally.

The horses burned in the fire were valued around \$30,000, and only a few were covered by insurance. The barn which is owned by the Calgary Exhibition Board, was completely destroyed.

An adjoining barn was also set on fire and was badly scorched.

Jimmy Rags, a trainer for the Emmert stable, was badly burned around the head and arms when he endeavored to save some of the horses. J. Obee Jockey of the Emmert stable was overcome by smoke while also assisting to get horses out, and several others also suffered from smoke in a heroic but vain effort to save the animals.
