KILLED MAN IN
SELF DEFENCE

Wrong for a Minister to
Shoot in Self
Defence.

Des Plaines, Ills., July 21—Rev. J. Frank Norris, Fort Worth, Texas, who shot and killed D. E. Chipps, wealthy lumberman in "self defense" was severely rebuked by a brother minister, Rev. Morgan Williams, Evans-ton, Ills., at the eDs Plaines, Metho-dist Episcopal Camp meeting. "It did not take me long to enlist in the war," Rev. Mr. Williams said, "but it does not follow that a minister ought to take a revolver in hand and shoot a fellow man, even on the plea of self defense."

"If the minister had been called upon to defend his wife he might have been justified in shooting, but not in self defense, it is the minister's busi-ness to give his life and not to take the life of another."

Rev. Mr. Williams was heartily con-gratulated by his audience upon com-pletion of his arraignment of the Tex-as minister late yesterday.

NEW BRUNSWICK
MAJORITIES AT
LAST ELECTION

In the Federal election of October last, the Province of New Brunswick returned ten Conservatives and one Liberal. In all but two cases the majorities ran into four figures, the largest being that of Mr. R. B. Hanson in York-Sunbury. Mr. Robichaud of Gloucester was the only Liberal returned and his majority was greatly reduced as compared with the previous election.

MAY WITHDRAW
I. C. R FROM THE
COMMISSION

Montreal, July 20—An Ottawa special to The Star says:

"There is a strong presumption here that when Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen speaks at Moncton on Thursday night, he will announce the intention of his Government to withdraw the Inter-colonial Railway from the jurisdiction of the Railway Commission and leave the fixing of rates to the Department of Railways under Hon. W. A. Black of Halifax, the new minister. Mr. Meighen may also announce the removal of the headquarters of the road from Montreal back again to Moncton."

"The Intercolonial was brought under the Railway Commission and made a part of the Canadian National System by order-in-council under the Consolidation Act. It is the contention that it can be put back where it was, also by order-in-council."

CONSERVATIVES
OF QUEBEC ONCE
MORE UNITED

Ottawa, July 20—Hon. E. L. Patenaude who appeared on the platform with Mr. Meighen at Ottawa tonight, declared that Quebec Conservatives were now beneath the same banner ready for combat and confident of victory. Throughout his speech, Mr. Patenaude pressed the point: "There is no hope for a country unable to provide itself with stable government." And he argued that all should work for stability of government.

Senator Gideon Robertson, Minister of Labor in the former Conservative Government, devoted his address to reviewing the actions of the King administration which, he declared, had been at the mercy of the passing whims of various groups which held the balance of power.

WILL CONTEST
PRINCE ALBERT

Prince Albert, Sask., July 20—Right Hon. William Lyon Mackenzie King, leader of the Liberal party, was unanimously nominated to contest the constituency of Prince Albert by a Liberal convention here today.

SLUMP OF THE FRENCH
FRANC HAS CREATED A
BIG PANIC IN PARIS

Thousands of Excited People Throng the Stores
Seeking to Exchange Money for Goods—The
Situation is Aggravated by Wild Rumors—
Bankers are Very Pessimistic—Herriott the
Last Man to Restore Confidence.

PARIS, July 22—Stores in the exclusively French sections of Paris were swamped today by thousands of persons seeking to trade francs for goods of any value. The drama of the franc best could be seen in these districts where wild rumors seriously aggravated the situation. The descent upon the neighborhood stores was precipitated by a report that the franc had slumped to 300 to the pound, which would have made it worth less than one cent. Bankers were pessimistic. Their customers were withdrawing tremendous sums in francs to buy foreign bonds. "I never saw such a flight of francs", a banker told the United Press. "People are trying all sorts of tricks such as stuffing 1000 franc bills in automobile tires to cross the frontier. This will continue until confidence is restored. Herriot is the last man to restore it."

Report was Denied

Rumor that Finance Minister Denonzie had resigned was officially denied. American banks, such as the American Express Company, were full of Americans exchanging travellers' cheques for francs with which to buy at the unprecedently low prices. Stores in the Rue De La Paix raised prices hourly today to keep pace with the depreciating exchange but depart-

ment stores with predominately French clients were unable steadily to increase prices to dollar values for fear of the temper of their French customers. One important store opened two hours early today to enable clerks to change the prices of every article in stock. The manager arranged to receive hourly quotations on the franc and announced that henceforth everything would be sold on a dollar basis.

SOME POINTED EXTRACTS FROM
THE SPEECH OF PREMIER MEIGHEN

We propose to take practical steps, along the lines of our resolution of June, 1925, to extend to products of the Maritime Provinces and the Western provinces, the markets of Central Canada, and especially to extend the use of Canadian coal by Canadian consumers and the employment by Canadian shippers of our Maritime ports.

"We propose to lay the basis of a practical, vigorous and fruitful immigration, and that basis shall be first of all, employment for the people of Canada. On that rock alone we will build, for only on the foundation of employment within our own country can the wisest of immigration policies ever succeed."

"If returned to power, the present Government will stand ready to put into force such a policy as will enable the farmers of Canada to build up a marketing system which will compare in efficiency with that of any agricultural country in the world."

"We propose, when in office to make it our first charge that every department will be roused to a sense of its stern duty to the Canadian people and its stern responsibility to account for every dollar committed to its charge."

"We ask for a mandate from the Canadian people to end the weary years of fickleness and instability in financial and fiscal affairs; to restore definitely and clearly the principle of protection in the tariff of Canada."

"There are those including the late prime minister himself, who have sought to raise a sectional cry; even out of the customs investigation, and who have declared that it was aimed chiefly at the Province of Quebec. The

cry is baseless; it is worse than that, it is childish."

"This country may be ever so rich by nature, our mines may give up their precious treasure; our waters may surrender their wealth of food; our soil may produce its harvests in abundance, but what of all these blessings if there is fraud and incompetence in the very vitals of government?"

"In the customs department the government made itself the ally of fraudulent traders of other countries to enable them to dispose of their wares to the people of Canada."

"Voices come to us from all over this land, voices of men of all parties and creeds, voices from the clear-thinking minds of the women of our country, declaring that this kind of administration is not for the Dominion of Canada."

"It can be definitely stated that never within a century, never in the history of parliamentary government as we have it today, has any prime minister ever demeaned himself to ask for dissolution while a vote of censure on his own government was under debate. In the present case that happened."

"Nothing could be worse for Canada than to impeach the conduct of the representative of the throne and bring the great and revered link of empire into the turmoil of political strife. Nothing could be more indefensible, nothing indeed more censurable than that such a step should be taken in the presence of the admitted truth that the representative of His Majesty acted with scrupulous honesty."

"We feel it our duty to review the situation and await the verdict of the people and in the meantime to admin-

LIBERALS HELD
A MEETING AT
SAINT JOHN

Will Endeavor to Con-
test Every N. B. Con-
stituency.

MAKING PLANS
FOR CAMPAIGN

Decide Not to Raise the
Constitutional
Issue.

St. John, July 21—The record of the King administration, including tariff reductions, reductions in income and automobile taxes and postage rates, and the abolition of the receipt tax will be material for the many planks in the platform of the Liberal party in the federal campaign, according to plans adopted at a meeting, held yesterday afternoon at the Admiral Beatty of the Provincial Liberal Committee. Hon. Dr. W. E. Foster, chairman of the committee, presided.

Prominent Liberals from many parts of the province were present, every constituency in New Brunswick being represented. Hon. Dr. Peter J. Veniot, former premier of the province, who has recently completed a tour of several of the North Shore constituencies, was delegated by them to act as their representative at yesterday's meeting.

The meeting was unanimously of the opinion that there should be no discussion of constitutional questions.

There will be no acclamations, it was said at the conference yesterday. Every constituency will be contested.

Hon. D. W. Mersereau of Fredericton Junction and C. R. Hawkins were present from York-Sunbury. Others present included Hon. P. J. Veniot, Hon. A. A. Dysart, E. S. Carter, Hon. Dr. Hetherington, Hon. J. E. Michaud, and Hon. W. E. Foster.

ROBBERS MADE
A BIG HAUL
IN DIAMONDS

New York, July 19—Robbers got away with \$75,000 in unset diamonds shortly before 1 o'clock today, after holding up two jewelers and a customer in a ninth floor office of the Silversmiths Building at 15 Maiden Lane. Two of the hold-up men got out of the building before anti-burglar devices had automatically stopped the seven elevators.

The third robber, he who had actually taken the gems from Abraham W. Faigin, part occupant of the office in which the robbery was perpetrated, raced down the stairway to the ground floor. Miss Helen Thume of Jersey City, the elevator starter, and the building superintendent, Claude Benedict warned by burglar alarms grabbed him. He fired one shot at him, shook him, self loose and fled through a crowd of frightened girl stenographers and other employees. He reached John Street through an arcade from the elevators and escaped.

NEW FRENCH
CABINET MAY
SOON RESIGN

Meeting Was Called To-
day to Consider the
Situation.

SITUATION
IS SERIOUS

More Inflation is Neces-
sary to Enable Govt.
to Carry On.

Paris, July 21—The French Cabinet was to meet today in extraordinary session at the call of Premier Edouard Herriot to decide whether or not it should resign in the face of financial difficulties which undoubtedly would necessitate tremendous further inflation.

The financial situation is so serious that further inflation of from five billion to six billion francs approximately \$100,000,000 or \$120,000,000 would be necessary if the Cabinet decided to carry on.

ACCIDENT
PATIENTS SHOW
LITTLE CHANGE

Miss Mooers Likely to be
Ill Long Time — Don-
ald Slipp in Serious
Condition.

Reports from Victoria Hospital today at noon on the condition of the patients who came from last Saturday's motoring accident are that Miss Adeline Mooers who has an injured spine is better as also is Wallace McAdam who suffered severe cuts and a shaking up. Donald Slipp shows little change in condition. He sustained a crushed spine and is in serious condition. Arthur Sewell of Devon who was trampled by a team of horses Monday is reported very much improved.

Both Miss Mooers and Mr. Slipp are paralyzed in the lower parts of their bodies as the result of injuries to their spines. The illness of Miss Mooers is likely to be long drawn out.

WHY ROBB DID
NOT GET THE
PREMIERSHIP

Ottawa, July 21—In current gossip, further details filter out of the motives that swayed political events in the closing days of this session.

It is now learned that a strong group of Liberals and Progressives worked to the end of facilitating King's defeat, and then Meighen's defeat, hoping that the governor-general would be forced to call upon someone else to attempt the formation of a government. Their choice was Robb and it would then have been Robb and neither King nor Meighen who would have had to go to the country.

Robb might have been chosen Liberal leader last fall if King had been allowed to resign, as, indeed, he wanted to do, following the election. But swayed by promise of Progressive support, King carried on, although his party was not the strongest.

Forty-seven Years' Service.

Peter Clinch after forty-seven years' service as secretary of the New Brunswick Board of Fire Underwriters, has been superannuated by that body. J. Cecil Mitchell will succeed him. The change is to go into effect November 1st. Mr. Clinch often has visited Fredericton officially.
