IS SERIOUS

More Inflation is Necessary to Enable Govt. to Carry On.

(Special to the Daily Mail by British United Press) Paris, July 21—The French Cabinet was to meet today in extraordinary session at the call of Premier Edouard Herriot to decide whether or not it should resign in the face of financial difficulties whch undoubtedly would necessitate tremendous further inflation.

The financial situation is so serous that further nflation of from live billion to six billion francs approximately \$100,000,000 or \$120,-000,000 would be necessary if the Cabinet decided to carry on.
