# Premier Meighen Sounds Keynote of the Campaign

**Announces at Great Meeting in Ottawa That the Election Will Take Place on September 14th—The Customs Frauds Dealt with in a Vigorous Manner—A True National Policy Laid Down for the Dominion—Will Revive Protective Features of the Tariff—Markets of Central Canada to be Opened to the Maritimes.**

Ottawa, July 20—Canada goes to the polls on Tuesday, September 14.

In his speech tonight Premier Meighen definitely announced the date. The campaign will be of just eight weeks' duration. Mr. Meighen began his Dominion campaign here tonight.

Near the conclusion of his speech Hon. Mr. Meighen outlined his policy promises if elected. They include:

1. To extend to products of the Maritimes and the Western provinces the markets of Central Canada and especially to extend the use of Canadian coal by Canadian consumers and the employment by Canadian shippers of Canadian ports.

2. To put in force such a policy as will enable the farmers of Canada to build-up a marketing system which will compare in efficiency with that of any agricultural country in the world.

**Immigration Policy.**

3. To lay the basis of a practical, vigorous and fruitful immigration, and that basis shall be first of all employment for the people of Canada.

4. To make it the first charge of the Government that every department will be roused to its stern duty to the Canadian people and its stern responsibility to account for every dollar committed to its charge.

5. To restore definitely and clearly the principles of protection in the tariff of Canada.

Hon. Mr. Meighen opened with the charge that in every attempt at initiating important legislation the King government had bungled and many times been compelled to reverse its proposals and withdraw its bills. In the main, the Prime Minister dealt with revelations before the Customs Committee and the constitutional issue raised by Mr. Mackenzie King.

"Do you think," Premier Meighen sharply questioned, referring to the customs investigation, "do you think that a government buried under the revelations which that evidence contains, do you think a government censured by a parliament where the majority were its friends, do you think such a government should be exonerated by the people of Canada?"

**Refers to Losses.**

"I ask you again," he went on, "do you believe a government responsible for the loss of millions of money of the Canadian people, responsible for frauds unnumbered, responsible for the wrecking of the livelihood of thousands of our workers by the competition of smuggled goods, responsible in a word for the utter collapse of a great department of state—do you think such a government should get a certificate of character and be declared by the electors of Canada to be the kind of government the people want?"

**King's Action Natural.**

So it was only natural, continued Premier Meighen, that Mr. Mackenzie King should choose some issue other than the customs report. The name of the King's representative had been dragged into the arena. The conduct of His Majesty's representative had been flatly challenged by Mr. King on the floor of parliament, "and from that challenge," the Prime Minister pursued, "I think Mr. Mackenzie King himself would now like to escape."

No action could be more censurable "in the presence of the admitted truth than that the representative of His Majesty acted with scrupulous honesty."

**No Constitutional Issue.**

Mr. Meighen took his point further. "As a matter of truth," he declared, "there is no constitutional issue. Did anyone believe that any government, at any time, was entitled to a dissolution when a vote of censure was under review. It had been said that in a hundred years the King had not refused a dissolution in Great Britain but had any government in a hundred years ever asked for dissolution with a vote of censure under debate. "I give the answer myself," said Mr. Meighen. "Never in the history of parliamentary institutions as we have it today, has any prime minister demeaned himself ever to ask for a dissolution while a vote of censure was under debate."

**Saw Days Numbered.**

"Mr. Mackenzie King saw that the

days of his administration were numbered; and he decided to change the jury. To demand the right of dissolution with a vote of censure under review was not to plead for responsible government; it was to plead for irresponsible government. To demand such a right was not to uphold but to stifle parliamentary institutions. It was not to plead the cause of parliament. It was to choke and strangle parliament and prevent parliament from expressing its will.

**Lemieux Appointed.**

Mr. Meighen announced that Sir Francois Lemieux, Chief Justice of Quebec, had been appointed to continue the customs investigation. He declared that it was the intention of his government to restore definitely and clearly the principle of protection in the customs tariff. He declared that the government intended to lay the basis of a practical and vigorous immigration policy. And that basis would be first of all employment for the people of Canada. "On that rock and on that rock alone," he added, "will we build."

**A Maritime Policy.**

After dealing in a trenchant manner with the record of the King Government, the customs charges and the constitutional question which has been raised the Premier said:

"We propose to take practical steps along the lines of our resolution of June, 1925, to extend to producers of the Maritime Provinces and the western provinces, the markets of Central Canada, and especially to extend the use of Canadian coal by Canadian consumers and the employment by Canadian shippers of our own Maritime ports."

"For the past 50 years the attention of our agricultural institutions has largely if not efficiently been directed to the problems of 'production'—originating new varieties of grains and improving our breeds of farm products. Very marked progress along all lines of improved production has been made but I feel sure that the economic results to the farmer would have been much greater had we at the same time built up an economic, efficient, business-like method of marketing our farm products."

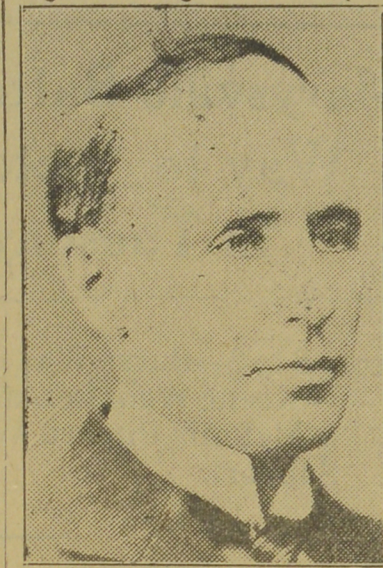
**Tardy in Marketing.**

"Few agricultural countries of the world have made greater progress in 'production' than Canada, but few have been as tardy as we in recognizing, as a great national question, the economic marketing of these products. Denmark, during the past 30 years has built up a system of production and co-operative marketing which has placed her in the forefront of the agricultural countries of the world. Her farm products today command the highest prices in the great consuming markets. The governments of South Africa, New Zealand and Australia have recognized the national importance of this question of the ordinary marketing of farm products and by laws and regulations, have established commodity co-operative marketing of farm products as a national policy. This system has been adopted with marked success in many branches of agriculture in the United States."

**Wheat Pool is Example.**

"This system of commodity co-operative marketing is comparatively new in Canada and has been adopted in only a few commodities—the wheat pool of the west is the most outstanding example. In several of the provinces a beginning has been made in organizing other commodities as might well be expected in some cases the results obtained by the producers have been disappointing."

These efforts have not been wasted and out of the experience gained I feel that our farmers will profit and rebuild, adhering to sound and proven principles. The chief of these sound principles is that marketing associations should stand on their own feet and be entirely free of government control. I want to say to the farmers of Canada, after some study of the marketing question, that I believe they are on the right track and that the Conservative party of which I am leader, stands ready to support in every legitimate way available to a government, this very worthy movement of theirs to establish an economic and efficient method of marketing their products.

**To Build Up System.**

"If returned to power, the present government will stand ready to put into force such a policy as will enable the farmers of Canada to build up a marketing system which will compare in efficiency with that of any agricultural country in the world."

"I have now to announce the date of the election has been fixed for the 14th day of September next."

**Appeal to People.**

"Our appeal now to the people of Canada can be put in a few words and with these words I close. We ask them to study the policy embodied in the resolution by which the Conservative party stands, moved in the House of Commons on the 2nd of June, 1925. We believe the great articles of policy there laid down are sound for this Dominion and when given effect will make for unity, prosperity and expansion. We lay before them the administrative record of the late government as revealed by the files of its own committee and from the mouths of its own witnesses, and we ask you to condemn with your votes inefficiency and gross infidelity to public trust."

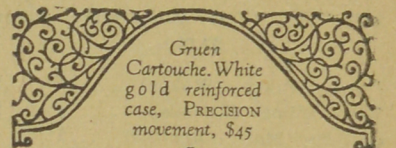
