## HOLYROOD WALTER WON PACING DERBY

Purse of \$25,000 in Kalamazoo Event—Eighteen Starters Made a Record Field on Grand.

Kalamazoo, Mich., July 20—A little brown gelding named Holyrood Walter, seven years old, owned by Roger V. Whiteside, of Duluth, Minn., won the \$25,000 American pacing derby, richest of all harness events, in the Grand Circuit meeting here today.

The race, the Kentucky Derby of the harness world, drew a record breaking entry of 18 starters, largest field that has appeared on the Grand Circuit in 20 years, with an attendance of 10,000 to 12,000.

## CANADIANS SHOWED WELL SECOND DAY

At Havana Crocker and Wright Held Their Own Against Cuban Tennis Experts—The Play.

Havana, Cuba, July 18—Canada stood two-all in the second round of the Davis Cup matches when rain stopped further play this afternoon.

After losing the doubles yesterday in a desperate struggle in which Crocker and Jack Wright carried Paris and Chacon to five sets, the Canadian team retrieved its fortune in the first match this afternoon when Wright downed Vincente Banet 6-4, 7-5, 6-2.

**Wright Easy Winner.**

The Canadian champion had little difficulty with his opponent whose best effort came in the second set.

It quickly appeared that the Cuban who had been defeated on Friday by Crocker, was no match for Wright, whose placements were accurate and fast enough to keep Banet chasing from one side of the court to the other. After the second set and a desperate rally Banet was so exhausted that he was easy for the Canadian. Interest in the tournament increased with the announcement that the matches were now tied and the gallery was largely augmented as Crocker and the Cuban took part.

The sun had come out and the sky was a broiler. Crocker's chances were not considered any too good by the "wisacres" who had witnessed his partial collapse after his singles on Friday and again after the doubles yesterday.

The fact that he was able to take three out of seven games from the cautious and clever Paris came therefore as a surprise to the gallery and with pleasure to Canadian supporters.

After yesterday's match Crocker who had netted the last point, was carried off the court by his friends. Dr. Vincente Banet attended the Canadian and said that he merely suffered from exhaustion. However, the fact that Crocker had been worn down by a cold which he caught soon after his arrival here and by two days of gruelling work on the courts, caused considerable anxiety among the supporters of the Canadian team.

The casualties have not been confined to the Canadian side. Paris appeared on the court yesterday with a brace on his ankle, explaining that he had strained it in his singles match with Wright on Friday.

**Doubles Interesting.**

Yesterday's doubles furnished the feature play of the matches, lengthy and brilliant rallies by both teams winning applause. The Canadians began well winning the sixth and seventh games of the first set by love scores, but the determination of Paris and Chacon brought them the first lieu on the match 8-6.

Net rushing tactics indulged in by Crocker and Wright counted the second and third sets for the Canadians, the Cubans' lobbing being ineffective. The fast smashing game told on Crocker in the fourth set, however, and the Canadians went down 8-6, when the Cubans who seemed less affected by the heat, pressed their advantage. Both Wright and Crocker were near exhaustion, as the fifth set went quickly to Cuba 2-6.

## UNIQUE RACE FOR CYCLISTS

Paris, July 20—Lucien Buysse of Belgium has won the "Circuit of France" bicycle race, which began June 20. The race was in 17 stages and covered 3,600 miles the elapsed time being 238 hours 44 minutes and 25 seconds.

The course skirted the Atlantic from Dunkirk to Biarritz, thence along the Mediterranean to Mentone and then the Italian and Swiss frontiers crossing both the Pyrenes and the Alps.

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
