## VIERKOETTER GIVEN HONORS IN GERMANY

Gertrude Ederle Congratulates German Swimmer — War Prejudice is Forgotten in Reception.

Calais, France, Sept. 2.—Ernst Vierkoetter the German swimmer who yesterday broke the record for the English Channel crossing declared today he was ready to accept Gertrude Ederle's challenge for a match race across the channel next year. Vierkoetter said he had already retained a tug for next season.

Miss Ederle, first woman to cross the channel in a message to Vierkoetter yesterday, said: "I hope I can race you across the channel next summer to bring the record back to my sex and my country."

War antagonisms were forgotten today when Vierkoetter was received by the municipal authorities and given the unreserved plaudits of whole city for his record breaking channel crossing of yesterday.

The climax of the reception came when Mayor Leon Vincent presented Vierkoetter with a medal commemorating the feat and the Frenchmen of Calais drank the German's health in champagne.

Vierkoetter leaves tonight for Cologne, where despatches indicate a tremendous reception is awaiting him.

**Honored in Germany.**  
Berlin, Sept. 2.—Ernst Vierkoetter who swam the English Channel has been awarded the Plaque of the Great Eagle by the National Committee of Physical Training which is the highest official recognition to be won in Germany for athletic achievement.

## HOBBS MADE BATTING RECORD

London, Sept. 2.—Playing at Lord's against Middlesex in a scheduled county cricket match, Jack Hobbs, England's premier batsman, broke another record of the famous cricket ground, when he scored 316 runs in one inning for Surrey.

The previous record at Lord's was 315 made by Percy Holmes of Yorkshire last year. Hobbs' latest accomplishment is also the highest score that he has yet made in his whole career. He batted seven hours and hit 41 fours.

## BRYDGES MAY BE WITH PATS

Ottawa, Ont., Sept. 2.—It was reported here last night that Bill Brydges star defence man of the Port Arthur team for the past two years in both of which seasons they won the Allan Cup has turned professional and will play for Toronto St. Pats next season. Brydges, whose home is in Renfrew, is now in Toronto and is reported to have been signed to play for the Irish at a salary of \$5,600 in addition to a position in the Queen City.

## FRISCH DONE WITH GIANTS

Captain Frank Frisch of the New York Nationals has not yet rejoined the team, after jumping it in St. Louis, following an alleged row with Manager McGraw. The latter has issued a number of statements calculated to minimize the trouble. Until the complete facts come out, no verdict in the matter can be reached, but the affairs of a baseball club are esoteric, only vague rumblings reaching the public occasionally. Even though Frisch should eventually return it is believed he has outlived his usefulness as a Giant. McGraw also announces the release of Catcher Frank Snyder on waiver to St. Louis and the signing of DeVormer, hard hitting backstop from Louisville.

## RIBBON CANE WON FREE-FOR-ALL AT HOULTON

Took Two Heats and El Verso One — Bessie McKlyo, the Favorite, Took Only Third Money.

Houlton, Me., Sept. 2.—Ribbon Cane (2.01½) rather upset the talent today by outracing Bessie McKlyo (2.01½) the Presque Isle pacer in the free-for-all, the feature event of the racing at the Houlton Fair today. The Medford (Mass.) pacer outdashed the McKlyo mare in two fast finishes, having plenty of speed, showing a quarter in 30½ seconds in the first heat. El Verso (2.05¼) the Fort Fairfield gelding carried the field in every heat well up to the last turn and won the last heat, Ribbon Cane getting away to a bad start.

The 2.20 trot was a hot race, the first heat being a dead heat between Hedgewood K. and Twinkling Chick and every heat was with a whipping finish. The weather was chilly and windy.

## ST. LOUIS CARDS WON TWICE FROM CININNATI

Alexander Took Revenge on Former Team-mates — Row Among the Fans — Tigers Beat St. Louis.

New York, Sept. 2.—St. Louis increased its lead at the top of the National League to two games over Cincinnati today by taking both games of a double header 2 to 0 and 9 to 1.

Alexander held his former team mates to three hits by blanking them in the first game, while in the second game Them kept Chicago's blows well scattered. The visitors won both contests by bunching their hits.

**Fans Come to Blows.**

Fans came to blows as Alexander quit the mound with his shut-out victory in the first game. An uproar of boos and cheers greeted him as he walked to the dugout and immediately fists began to fly among those for and against the former Cub.

The police were quick in restoring order and near-calm had been achieved when the second game was called.

No other games were played. A "crucial" game was scheduled between the Pirates and Reds at Cincinnati, but was halted in the fourth inning with the Reds leading 3 to 0. After waiting two hours with the hope that the heavy rain would stop, one of the largest week-end crowds of the season disappointedly went home. The Reds at present in second place, hold a game advantage over the Pirates.

**American League.**

Only one game was played in the American League, Detroit defeating St. Louis 6 to 3 at Detroit today. The bats of Blue and Bassler had a lot to do with the Tiger victory, the pair of them driving in six runs. Manush also helped with three singles.

The Yanks were scheduled to continue their series with the Athletics at the Stadium but rain interfered. Rain at Washington also caused postponement of the Senator-Boston game.

Cleveland and Chicago were not scheduled.

## MILES BEAT HAMBOLDT

Pictou, N. S., Sept. 2.—At the Highland Braemar and Natal Day celebration held here yesterday, Johnny Miles, Marathon champion, demonstrated his superiority as a five-miler over Jimmy Hamboldt who defeated Miles at Antigonish in July in a five mile race. Miles started at a rapid pace and maintained it throughout double-lapping the rest of the field save Hamboldt whom he defeated by three quarters of a lap. Miles' time was 26 minutes 57 seconds.

## GRAHAM WON FROM SUGGS

New York, Sept. 2.—Bushy Graham, of Utica N. Y., stepped to the head of contenders for the bantamweight crown by overwhelming Chick Suggs, New Bedford negro, in the feature bout of a bantamweight carnival at Madison Square Garden tonight.

The New England champion was helpless before Graham's shifty attack, while the Utican flash landed at will on Suggs' head and body. Graham weighed 118; Suggs 118¼.

Paris, Sept. 2.—The Hotel de Paris, at Monte Carlo, made profits last year of 8,405,000 francs, allowing the dividend to be increased from 180 to 275 percent, says a published report. The Monte Carlo Casino also showed an increased business, while the Cannes Municipal Casino showed profits of 8,624,275, after starting in 1919 with a capital of 1,900,000 francs.

## LENGLEN TOUR TO OPEN OCT. 9 IN NEW YORK

Pyle Says Noted Opponents Will be Procured for Her — Mother is Travelling With Star.

New York, Sept. 2.—Mlle. Suzanne Lenglen's tour of the United States, Canada, Mexico and Cuba under the direction of Charles O. Pyle, will open at Madison Square Garden on Saturday, Oct. 9 and Sunday, Oct. 10. Contracts covering the New York appearance of the internationally famed tennis star were signed here today.

Mlle. Lenglen will arrive in New York, Sept. 27, accompanied by a retinue which will include her mother, the promoter announced. "Papa" Lenglen, owing to an aversion for ocean travel, will remain in France.

My. Pyle declared today that Mlle Lenglen will participate at the Garden in a singles match against a noted American woman player and in mixed doubles in opposition to another American woman star, with two of the best male players in this country in the game.

Several foreign players of great reputation will also appear in addition to Americans other than those playing against Mlle. Lenglen, he said.

"For obvious reasons I do not care at the present time to name the personnel of the players participating in the Lenglen tour" said Mr. Pyle, "but there will be no dearth of high class players to entertain the crowds. I am finding it much easier to land American players of ability and note, both men and women than I experienced in signing Mlle Lenglen."
