Appeared Before Magistrate This Morning—Chase and Crowley Given Remand Until Tuesday Next.

Stanley Colwell who pleaded guilty to a charge of theft of fur coats from J. Clark & Son Limited, being made a principal with John McGoldrick and Harry Mount, was given suspended sentence when he appeared again this morning before Police Magistrate Limerick. This was because of representations made by counsel J. J. F. Winslow, K. C., who pointed out the good previous record of the man in Saint John his former home and in Fredericton, and also the fact that he had not premeditated participation in theft being called with his taxi to meet the other two in the street after they had the coats.

This bird produced 253 eggs in twelve months and scored 296.4 points. The next highest on the list scored 264.7 points. Mrs. Raymond's pen laid 1,748 eggs and scored 1729.2 points, finishing in sixth place.

TEACHERS' INSTITUTE

Interesting Discussion Took Place This Morning—Miss Logan of Model School Gave a Lesson in "Word Building" and Miss Cecil Gallagher of Regent Street School Gave Lesson in "Primary English"—Claimed by Several That Arithmetic Requirements are Too Severe for Grades VI, VII and VIII.

The York & Sunbury Teachers' Institute this morning elected Haviland P. Hovey president for the ensuing year. Mr. Hovey is principal at Stanley. A number of interesting papers were presented and a discussion was precipitated by an address by Principal J. A. Hughes of Regent Street School who discussed "Teachers' Difficulties". Mr. Hughes and many others expressed the opinion that the curriculum of the grades below the High School was over-crowded and that there should be relief by leaving some of the work for the High School Grades. Arithmetic was said to be over-emphasized the time required being taken from reading, science and other subjects of importance.

Lesson Given.

Miss Mabel Logan of the Model School gave a lesson on "Word Building" to nine little tots of Grade I. Miss Logan's method was very successful the pupils learning the sounds of letters and combinations readily and spelling correctly and rapidly.

Inspector Fox discussed the lessons given by Miss Ross in Arithmetic the day before and that by Miss Logan very favorably. Reading was much neglected in some schools. The only two things in Reading were pronunciation and expression. It was astonishing how many simple words were habitually mispronounced. Much drill was needed. He protested against the rapid promotion in reading classes. He would standardize the rural grades. A pupil should not read in a grade ahead of his other subjects.

Prin. Wood spoke very favorably of both lessons. He thought some teachers neglected to teach the sounds of letters. The teaching in the primary grades had a great effect in after classes.

Miss Logan said her two months grade one pupils knew the names of all letters, one sound of each consonant, and the short sounds of the vowels.

ton admired Miss Ross's presentation of stocks and shares to Grade VII and her success with it. He believed personally that stocks and shares should be relegated to Grade VIII. He thought Miss Logan's method in reading was better than the old method. In the case of small children, the course of Institution does not leave enough time for language drill. Primary pupils from England and Massachusetts have less numberwork but are better readers than ours.

Primary English.

Miss Cecil Gallagher gave an illustrated address on "Primary English." She said that the pupil was largely what the teacher made him. The teacher must have great tact in correcting the pupil's mistakes, and must herself set a perfect example in conversation and action. She kept lists of mispronounced words and grammatical errors.

Miss Gallagher then took a class of ten in Grade III and drilled them on correct pronunciation of words on which some had previously made mistakes. Then errors in grammar were corrected in an interesting

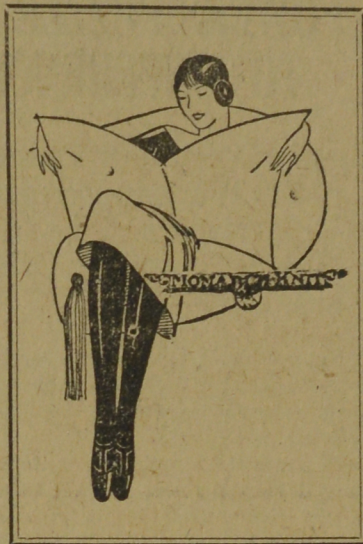
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SCHOLARSHIP AWARD.
