## WOODEN-LEGGED WARDEN AND PERFORMANCES OF BEARS ARE DISCUSSED BY PUBLIC ACCTS.

(Continued From Page One.) Chairman Smith remarked that bears might be plentiful in the uncivilized parts of the Province. There were few in Carleton.

The Chief Warden said that there could be a clause to permit farmers to kill bears molesting stock.

### Against Close Season.

Mr. Peck said he would oppose a close season on bears.

Mr. Taylor said the same. They were not game animals.

Mr. Oulton said he considered that bears were game animals.

### Round of Bear Stories.

The Committee heard a round of bear stories.

Mr. Peck told of one hundred sheep being killed by bears in Albert County, also of a farmer protecting his flock by means of a lantern. One night the lantern went out and the bears killed the sheep.

Mr. Taylor told of a party tenting near Minto which had all its supplies torn to pieces by bears and also of the same party being molested at night by the animals.

Mr. Oulton told of a bear entering

a tent in which he was sleeping with others and stealing deer-meat.

Chairman Smith told of an incident of his youth when on a drive. He was awakened by a companion to look straight into the eyes of a bear which had been sniffing around pork and molasses which were part of the supplies.

### The Partridge.

With regard to partridge the Chief Game Warden said the Department had the power to declare a close season before August 1st. He believed the natural enemies of the partridge were responsible for scarcity. It had been suggested to import the Hungarian partridge.

On April 12th a conference of provincial game wardens was to be held at Ottawa to discuss all these matters with the Federal authorities.

### Wooden Legged Warden.

Discussion on game wardens brought out the information that a wooden legged game warden had officiated in Saint John County and was unable to negotiate the snow on snow shoes.

The above schedule is based on the understanding that this amount will be paid subject to the following conditions.

(1) The crew to receive this sum of \$60.81 no matter if the cut is completed with less men; the wages of the absent members of the crew being divided on a pro-rata basis among those who actually performed the work.

Note—Method of dividing the amount to be agreed upon later.

If through no fault of the employees delays are occasioned beyond eleven hours and the employees are not released by the Foreman in charge they will be compensated on a basis of 30 cents per hour for all additional hours held on duty.

If work on cut cannot be completed within the hours above specified and employees are released Employees affected will be compensated for all time on duty on an hourly basis at one eleventh of the rate allowed each employee per cut for each hour worked.

### Long Wall Miners.

Wages of miners working on long wall faces to be 21 1-2 cents per foot, it being understood that the regulation depth of cut made by the coal cutting machine will be the capacity of the gib of the cutting machines now in operation, and further that miners will bore holes for explosives in long wall face. It is further understood if six daily allotments of coal are removed in any one week the rate will be advanced to 22 cents per foot for all coal removed during that period.

Miners must carefully observe the working of the Coal Conveyors employed to carry coal from the long wall face and not block operation of this machine. If machinery operating Coal Conveyor fails to function the foreman must be notified immediately and no miners shall leave his work unless permission to do so is previously obtained from the foreman in charge.

Miners taken from coal face to perform other additional duties by direction of Foreman will be paid at the rate of 40 cents per hour. Consideration for water will be paid at the prevailing rate of 50 cents per place, which figure its subject to alteration at any time due to working conditions.

### Surface Labor.

All men at present receiving \$2.90 per day of 9 hours to be paid at the rate of \$3.00 for a similar period all time on duty in excess of nine hours to be paid on a pro-rata basis.

It is further understood that no discrimination will be made against any employee for his activities in connection with the present labor dispute.

The above rates and rules governing the employees affected will

remain in effect until changed or cancelled. Sixty days notice from one party to the other must be given of their desire to do so.

Signed on behalf of Commission.

After considerable discussion it was accepted by the representatives who agreed to recommend it for acceptance to the miners in the field. James Mc Burnie, W. Colby De Wolfe, Harry Walker and J. A. St. Andre signed for the men. A. D. King the manager of the Minto Coal Company has wired the directors in Montreal whose acceptance is expected.

## SENATORS AND MONTREAL TIED IN PLAYOFF

Montreal, March 25—Ottawa Senators and Montreal Maroons will enter the second game of the final playoff for the National Hockey League title on an even footing. Before a crowd of 11,500 the two N. H. L. leaders battled to a 1-1 deadlock in the first game of the finals here tonight. The finish provided a climax which rivalled stagecraft at its best. Montreal scored in the second period of the fast and gruelling struggle on a long shot by Punch Broadbent, former Ottawa player.

Throughout the session the teams waged a terrific battle. It looked as if the Maroons were to take a one goal lead in the second game, when two minutes before the end, Hooley Smith benched and Ottawa was forced to conclude the contest with a man off.

## SMEARED SOAP ON CHICKENS IN HOSPITAL

Chicago, March 26—Finger prints in ketchup spilled on a table upset plans of two women employed in the county hospital kitchen to show their displeasure at not getting a raise in pay.

The housekeeper on whose table the ketchup was spilled discovered the disgruntled women had smeared green soap on the chickens for a special dinner, put salt in the coffee, pepper in the oatmeal and what not.

The hospital warden sent for his brother, a police officer, who secured confessions last night after taking the finger prints. The women were suspended.

## GUBERNATORIAL RECEPTION WAS WELL ATTENDED

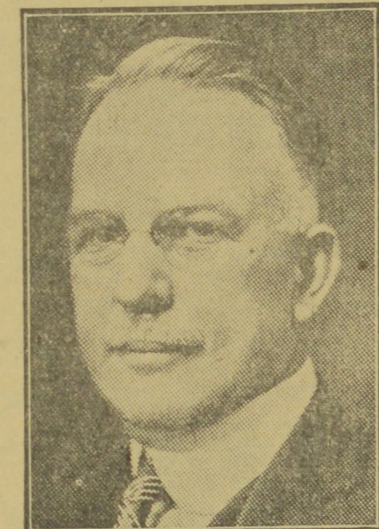
His Honor and Mrs. Todd Received at the House of Assembly on Thursday Afternoon.
