

## NASHWAAK TO BE STOCKED WITH SALMON FRY

Big Distribution For Next Summer—Will Try to Restore River as Salmon Stream.

Can the Nashwaak River be brought back as a salmon angling stream? It is evident that the officers of the Federal Department of Fisheries believe that it can, for on the application of Mr. R. B. Hanson, M. P., they have arranged to deposit from sixty thousand to one hundred thousand salmon fry at points along the river above Marysville during the present year. Mr. Hanson has been working on this matter for some time and was gratified a few days ago to receive a letter from Mr. W. A. Found, director of fisheries, informing him that his application had been granted. Mr. Hanson has asked that an annual allotment be made to this stream until it is completely restocked.

In the old days the Nashwaak was one of the best salmon streams in the province, but the erection of a dam at Marysville interfered with the free passage of the fish to the spawning beds and they were compelled to go elsewhere. A fishway constructed in the dam at Marysville a few years ago did not prove satisfactory and had to be replaced. The present fishway is said to be workable, if it is not it is to be presumed that it will be made so.

### A Splendid River.

The Nashwaak is a splendid river and the numerous quick water pools between Marysville and Stanley are readily accessible. Mr. Hanson says that it is his aim to make it as good an angling proposition as the Tobique. The development of the angling possibilities of this stream would undoubtedly be a great incentive to tourist travel.

Uncle Henry Braithwaite, the celebrated guide of this city, who served an apprenticeship with Gabe Acquin, the greatest of Indian guides long before Confederation, quotes Gabe as saying that salmon were so plentiful in the Nashwaak in the old days that an Indian with a spear could fill a canoe in a few hours. Uncle Henry says that when a boy he saw an English officer hook a salmon in front of where the Marysville cotton mill now stands, and lose it after it had wound the line around a floating log.

## OVERHAULING OF AGRIC. DEPT. IS DESIRED

E. W. Melville of Carleton Says \$50,000 Spent With no Visible Result—Sugar Beets.

The Committee on Agriculture of the Legislature met this morning with H. V. Dickson in the chair.

A motion made by W. B. Moore, Queen's seconded by E. W. Melville, Carleton was adopted to the effect that the Government exercise a stricter supervision of grants given by the Department of Agriculture to agricultural societies.

Mr. Melville said he would like to see a complete reorganization of the Department of Agriculture. There was an expenditure of \$50,000 in salaries from which there was no visible return.

### Sugar Beets.

A. R. Wetmore of Clifton appeared before the committee with a request for an investigation of the possibilities of sugar beet production in New Brunswick.

Mr. Wetmore described the process the pulping sugar beet for feed and the use of silos.

After considerable discussion on this question Mr. Agar suggested that the Legislature should give a sitting to the agricultural questions so that the utmost publicity might be given the country on the views of members.

After further discussion on the scope of the inquiry at the next meeting it was decided that horticulture should be taken up.

Committee adjourned until Wednesday morning.
