SUITS RETURN TO POPULARITY.

Two piece suits are expected to return to favor shortly with an increased popularity over anything fashion has known for several seasons. Nearly all the important designers are showing one piece dresses and short coats in their between season models, forerunners of what will be worn next spring.

Tailored suits will undoubtedly have an immense vogue as soon as spring comes. Until then the "dressy" creations which houses like Worth are sponsoring will point the way. They usually include a glorified bolero or fitted jacket and a one piece dress with a light top which simulates a blouse. These blouses are among the newest things Paris shows. Although they simulate separate slipovers. The best houses are making them in elaborate embroidered and spangled effects occasionally employing lames as the basis of embroidery. The skirts and jackets that go with them are most often of broadcloths.

As soon as warm weather comes one may expect to see these costumes carried out in a lovely choice of light colors. The costumes of kasha and light wools for southern

wear show that such suits are sure to find favor.

SHOE BUCKLES RAISE PRICES.

Two and three pairs of shoe buckles are used on some of the new shoe designs and cost of foot-gear has gone up proportionately. Small buckles are not only placed on the shoe but on each of several tiny straps over the instep. Their addition almost doubles the price of the shoe.

TURKISH PASTE

Two tablespoons gelatin, one half cup cold water, one half cup boiling water, one eighth teaspoon salt two cups sugar, one lemon (juice), one half package (one cup) dates, one fourth pound layer figs.

Soak the gelatin in the cold water five minutes, then add the boiling water. Stir in the sugar and salt and boil slowly for fifteen minutes removing the scum as it forms.

Add the pitted dates and figs which have been put through the food chopper and the lemon juice. Pour into a shallow pan which has

been rinsed in cold water. The paste should be one inch thick. Let stand until firm, loosen with a broad spatula and turn out on a board dredged with powdered sugar. Cut in squares and roll in powdered sugar. Recipe will yield one pound, ten ounces of candy about fifty squares.

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JELLIED CHICKEN.

1 tablespoon gelatin
1-4 cup cold water
3-4 cup hot chicken stock
1 cup diced chicken
1 cup cream
1 pimento cut in pieces
Salt and pepper.
Soak gelatin in cold water, dissolved. Add salt and pepper to taste. When beginning to thicken beat until frothy, then fold in whipped cream and other ingredients. Place in mold and chill for two hours. Serve on bed of water cress and garnish with mayonnaise. If canned chicken is used, water may replace the stock.

CONSERVATIVE PAYS A VISIT TO QUEBEC

Quebec, Jan. 19.—Hon. R. B. Bennett, leader of the Conservative party, was a visitor to Quebec today where he delivered two addresses and was tendered a public reception.

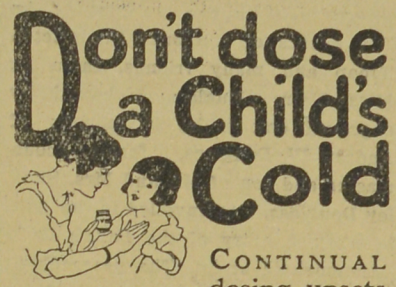
Speaking before the Canadian Women's Circle, Mr. Bennett said that one of the most difficult problems to be faced by Canadians was to develop in Canada a truly national spirit.

The speaker traced the role that Canadian women played in the conduct of the country before they were accorded the franchise, and particularly, since the right to vote was granted them; and he stressed the necessity for women developing complete understanding of the responsibilities which fall upon them through the use

of this prerogative in the administration of the country.

Speaks as Citizen.

"What should a woman ask herself?" Mr. Bennett asked. "Should she ask how she should vote? No, but she should ask why she is voting." Mr. Bennett insisted particularly that women who studied the history of the country should take a greater interest in the great problems which were apparent in municipal, provincial and national realms, and which needed so much attention.
