

TWO MEN INJURED AS VALLEY TRAIN LEAVES THE TRACK

F. Gamble and A. Dick-
ison Brakeman and
Expressman Sustain
Slight Injuries in
Train Accident To-
day Below Gagetown.

Fred Gamble, and Arthur Dickson, brakeman and expressman on express train No. 48 on the Valley line running between Centreville and St. John were injured this morning when the train ran off the track just below Gagetown. The injuries of both men are not thought to be serious. No cause has been given for the train's leaving the tracks. None of the passengers on the train were injured. The rails were badly torn and the cars damaged somewhat. The accident occurred at about 11 o'clock this morning when the train was on its way to St. John, with a number of passengers.

Cleaning Off Wreckage

Traffic today will be delayed but crews of men are now working at the task of clearing away signs of the wreckage and it is expected that the line will be ready for travel again tomorrow. A wrecking train with its crew of workers has already been sent down from this city. The probability is that everything will be clear again tonight.

Passengers to Saint John

A passenger train from Saint John arrived at the scene of the accident early this afternoon and conveyed passengers back to Saint John. A large number of interested spectators are viewing the scene of the mishap this afternoon. Persons from this city went by car to get a sight of the salvage operations.

Midweek Market

Vegetables and berries were the chief produce in the midweek market at Phoenix Square this morning. Strawberries sold at 22 cents a box, the highest they have been for several weeks. Raspberries were scarce and sold for 25 cents a box. Smaller boxes went for 13 cents. Fresh vegetables were plentiful. Cabbage in particular were very much in evidence, selling 3 for 25 cents. Carrots and beets sold for 10 cents a bunch or 3 for 25 cents. Peas were bought at 30 cents a quart. Meat was scarce, lamb being the chief seller. The price was 25 cents a pound.

FOUR GET JAIL SENTENCE FOR SELLING RUM

Local Men in the Police
Court Get Two Months
and \$200 For Liquor
Act Infractions—May
Appeal.

Monday night was a busy night for one of the Provincial Police plain clothes men when he rounded up four local persons suspected of selling liquor illegally and bought from each of them. As a result they were arrested yesterday and appeared before Magistrate Limerick in the local police court yesterday afternoon, charged with violating the N. B. Intoxicating Liquors Act. The four men were, Frank Webster, Sycamore Chase, Jack Allen and Frank Hughie. They were all fined two hundred dollars and costs with two months in jail and an additional six months in default of payment. It is possible that an appeal will be registered in two cases.

\$10,000 LIQUOR SEIZURE MADE AT MISCOU ISLAND

Prov. Police and Excise
Officers at Miscou Ef-
fect Large Haul of
Contraband Whiskey
Smuggled From the
Northern Islands.

No further word has been received at the local Provincial Police Headquarters in regard to the \$10,000 contraband liquor seizure at Miscou Island, which took place on Monday by Provincial Police working in conjunction with the Customs Excise Preventive Service on Miscou Island, Gloucester County. Expectation that another similar seizure would be made before many hours has not yet materialized though search has been continued in this region since the finding of the first.

Smuggled From St. Pierre

The liquor is thought to have been smuggled in to the province from St. Pierre and Misquolon islands by daring rum-runners in schooners used for that purpose. Monday's large haul has been the result of diligent investigation in and about Misquolon Island for the past many weeks. The
