

NEW BRUNSWICK RUGBY LEAGUE OPENS OCT. 20

St. John, Oct. 13.—The New Brunswick Rugby League which was suggested for the town teams of the province materialized yesterday when arrangements were made to play the opening game on Saturday October 20 when Moncton will appear in Saint John and Fredericton will go to Woodstock. On the following Saturday, Saint John will go to Moncton and Woodstock will appear in Fredericton. The winners of these games will play off for the championship of the province.

It has been the ambition of Rugby followers to have a league including the town teams for it was understood that they had little chance against the college teams, which had more time for training and more material from which to select. It is believed that the town teams will put up a good brand of Rugby and that the matches will prove of interest to those witnessing the games.

GOLFERS ON TRIP

Farrel, Diegel, Hagen To Make Tour To Berlin Next Year—Trip Is Virtually Assured.

New York, Oct. 13.—Three golf champions—Johnny Farrell, U. S. open titleholder; Leo Diegel, New York state champion; and Walter Hagen, British open winner—conferred yesterday with Hans Samek, Berlin clothing manufacturer and golf booster, over details of a trip by the members of the American Ryder Cup team to Berlin next year to play in the German open tournament. The trip to Germany is virtually assured. The dates of the German open will be fixed accordingly, either for the last week-end of April or for May 15 and 17 which would be after the British open and the Anglo-American Ryder Cup matches.

SETS NEW RECORD

Winnipeg Sets New Record For Pacing Geldings When He Raced Mile in 1.58 1/2. Quarter Times Were .30; .58 1/2; 1.28 1/2 and 1.58 1/2. Palin Drove.

Cleveland, Oct. 13.—Winnipeg, for which E. J. Baker, of St. Charles II, paid \$25,000 recently set a new world's record for pacing geldings at the Port Miami harness races here yesterday in turning the mile against time in 1.58 1/2. The former record of 1.59 1/4 was held jointly by Winnipeg Sir Roch and Frank Bosh.

The quarterly times were: .30, .58 1/2, 1.28 1/2 and 1.58 1/2. The last quarter was into a stiff head wind. Sep Palin was the driver.

FREDERICTON HIGH DEFEATED ROTHESAY 11 TO 0 YESTERDAY

Yellow and Black Squad Showed Marvelous Form Against Rothesay Collegiate School—Patterson and Goodspeed Scorers—Coach Cass Has Team Working Better Together—Watson Injured But Will Play Today Against St. John—Local Boys Need Today's Game.

High School broke into the win column yesterday when they defeated the Rothesay Collegiate School fifteen at Rothesay by a score of 11 to 0. The game was hard fought all the way with the winners scoring twice in the first half and once in the second.

The capital team appeared to work together much better than in their first game of the league season against Saint John at Fredericton. They started the scoring about a minute from the opening whistle. Rothesay fumbled following the kick-off, the Fredericton forwards dribbling the ball to the goal line, where Goodspeed picked it up and scored in the corner. Patterson converted from a difficult angle.

Patterson got the second tally after a pretty piece of work by the three quarter line ending in a neat run.

Watson made the most spectacular run of the period, intercepting a pass on his own 25 yard line and carrying the ball until brought down just over the opposing five yard line.

The winners got their last try about five minutes after the opening of play in the second half. Patterson got the ball after a scrum on the Rothesay five yard line and dodged his way across.

Watson suffered an injury to his arm during the second period but continued to play. Coach Cass was working on the arm as it was and the player was expected to be ready for today's game with Saint John High School.

STAMPS TO HONOR LATEST MONARCH

New York, Oct. 13.—Advices from Tirana, the capital of Albania, are that preparations are being made for a new issue of postage stamps paying proper attention to the election of Ahmed Zogu as king of the Albanians. During the 15 years of its existence as an independent state, Albania has proved exceptionally prolific in stamp issues, of which there are today more than 300 distinct varieties.

Since 1927 the portrait of Ahmed Zogu as president had figured on all stamps, the head surmounted by a laurel wreath in recognition of his national services. The new stamps are expected to be similar—possibly a later portrait, together with the motto "Rrofte Mbreti," or "Long Live the King," which was first inscribed in honor of the first King, Prince William of Wied, placed there by the Ambassadors' Congress of London in 1913.

A training school for the encouragement of home industries is being talked of in Winnipeg, following the Polkson Festival held in that city recently under the auspices of the Canadian Pacific Railway. Montreal, it may be noted, has had for some years classes to teach their native handicrafts to children of foreign-born settlers, who would otherwise be likely not to acquire the skill they would have developed in their own country.

W. N. Beach, a hunter and photographer of wild life who had the unique distinction of finding two different pairs of locked antlers during his career, was a recent visitor to the General Tourist Department of the C. P. R. at Montreal. Locked antlers are very rarely found and one of the two pairs discovered by him are so firmly interlocked that they cannot be pulled apart by two strong men, and to be separated would have to be cut.

"In all my experience I have not previously found so general a feeling of complete confidence in this country and its possibilities as was observed in the cities and districts where we made stops and had an opportunity of talking things over with their representative citizens" was the statement made by E. W. Beatty, president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, who has just returned to Montreal from an eight thousand mile tour over the company's western lines, accompanied by a party of directors and Montreal financiers.
