WELL KNOWN MAN
SHOT IN THE ARM
WHILE HUNTING

Cecil Delaney Suffered Injury to Arm When Gun Discharged Following Fall — Victim Resting Easier Today.

Cecil Delaney, formerly of Cape Breton, but for the last few years residing in this city and Devon, sustained a bloody and painful injury to his arm on Thursday afternoon while hunting, when the high powered rifle which he was carrying accidentally discharged, when he slipped and fell over a skid in the forest near Maple Grove. The bullet passed through the unfortunate hunter's arm in the muscle part between the wrist and elbow and caused much pain before it was finally attended to by a physician. An examination of the wound afterwards showed that no bones were broken.

Young Delaney was taken by companions to the home of Mrs. Fletcher at Green Hill and a doctor was summoned from Stanley. The wound was properly attended to as soon as the physician arrived and the young man made to feel as comfortable as circumstances would allow.

LAST SEASON
SAW THE RIVER
SEALED ON DEC. 4

Unusually Cold Nights Portends to Earlier Freezing of River — Last Night One of the Coldest Yet.

Though the weather in this vicinity has been fairly moderate during the past few weeks in the hours of the day, the evenings have been decidedly cold and the prospect is that the St. John river across from the capital city will again be frozen over before many days. Last year, the river closed on December 4th., which was in itself no record, for in a number of years the ice formed as early as November 10 and on one occasion even earlier.

The freezing of the river a week ago, due to the overnight cold weather, proved not permanent; for the warm sun of the succeeding day soon melted the ice and hastened its exit from the river. By nightfall of the next day every semblance of ice had disappeared from the river. On the night following, another thin layer had formed but it also soon disappeared leaving the river flowing in its usual steady manner.
