

CYRIL T. YOUNG ADDRESSES THE ROTARY CLUB

C. N. R. Official Says That Favorable Conditions for Minerals Exist in Northern Section of the Province.

Addressing Fredericton Rotary Club at their luncheon today, Cyril T. Young, F. R. G. S., of Toronto, Superintendent of Development, Canadian National Railways, who has recently commenced making explorations in the northern areas of this province, stated that very favorable conditions for discoveries of mineral existed in the northern interior sections.

As has been the case elsewhere across Northern Canada and Newfoundland, he said the heights of land areas were volcanic and intrusive disturbances occurred, were the most likely sections to look for mineral leposition. The rugged mountainous pre-Cambrian areas of northern New Brunswick intruded by granites and occasionally by Diabase were favorable areas in which to expect mineralization.

Mr. Young is continuing his explorations this summer and the Canadian National Railways will make known his findings to mining men and prospectors.

"New Brunswick may yet join the other provinces of Canada where mining today is giving an impetus to general business," said Mr. Young.

BEARS DESTROY POSTERS ON THE GAME REFUGE

Chief Game Warden Ritchie Returns From an Inspection Trip to the Lepreau Country—Moose Signs Plentiful.

The Lepreau Game Refuge consists of 94½ square miles of territory in Charlotte, Kings and Queens counties and Mr. Ritchie travelled all over the territory with Head Warden Jack Doran. The trip was made by boats and walking, Victoria and Adelaide Lakes of the Lepreau Watershed being visited, also Armond Lake, the headwater of New River.
