A REAL CHIEFTAIN

Hon. J. B. M. Baxter, Premier of New Brunswick is the most outstanding figure in the public life of the Maritime Provinces and no political leader which this province has produced since confederation ever had such a strong hold upon the people and enjoyed to so great a degree the esteem and confidence of his colleagues and supporters as does the present occupant of that high office. This was made abundantly clear at a complimentary banquet tendered the Premier at St. John last evening, when three hundred of his friends assembled from all parts of the province to do him honor and heard from his lips a review of splendid work accomplished by the administration which he so ably leads during its two years and eight months of office. It was a plain, but true story, told in modest and very plain language and every word bore the stamp of sincerity. It was a story of honest and efficient administration, a story of faithful and devoted service, a story of pledges redeemed and a story of progress and achievement which has brought about a marked improvement in the conditions of life for the 400,000 people who make their homes in this fair province. While the guests at the banquet had the pleasure of both seeing and hearing the Premier, thousands more of his friends in the central and southern parts of the province, thanks to the radio, the greatest of modern inventions, were able to "listen in" and get the full benefit of what was undoubtedly the most important and inspiring message ever handed out by a Premier in this province.

The Premier in the course of his address, when reviewing what had been accomplished by the different departments of the government, gave unstinted praise to his colleagues. He declared that there had been no dissensions in the cabinet and he had found all imbued with the same spirit, to render efficient service to the people who had put them in power.

The Liquor Control act naturally came in for some attention from the Premier and his frank recital of the circumstances which led to the repeal of the so-called prohibition law elicited hearty applause from the assembled guests.

Wonderful was the Premier's story of the achievements of the past three years, but more wonderful still was the vision of the blessings yet to be bestowed upon the people. He told of a conference at Montreal last week with A. R. Graustein, president of the International Paper Company and Archibald Fraser, head of the Fraser Companies, Limited, and announced amidst deafening applause that these mammoth concerns were to expend from \$25,000,000 to \$30,000,000 in the establishment of new sulphite and paper mills on the Restigouche and Miramichi and St. John Rivers and that all the power to be generated at Grand Falls would be needed to keep the wheels of industry revolving. It was an announcement of stupendous importance to the people of the province and the crowning achievement of the labors of the able, resourceful, energetic and talented man who is today piloting our good old ship of state and giving most faithful service to the people every day of the week.

Hon. Mr. Baxter has the distinction of being the first Premier of New Brunswick to broadcast a political speech by radio. He is also the only Premier to send his voice across the Atlantic by radio-telephone. He is the only Premier in modern times who has been able to show a surplus of receipts over expenditures. The three years the Baxter government has held office have certainly been epoch making years.

Archibald Graustein and Archibald Fraser are destined to play an im-

portant part in the industrial development of New Brunswick. After all there is something in a name.

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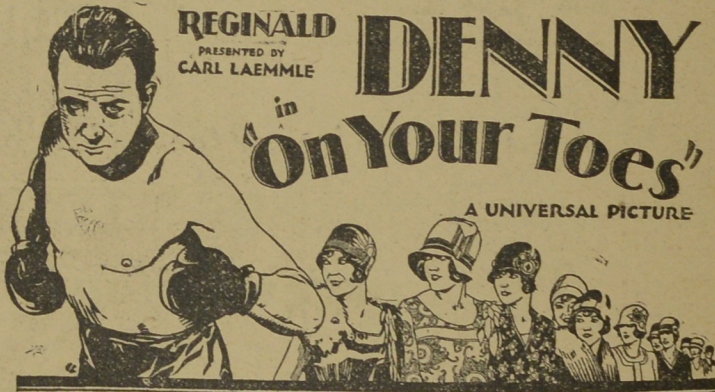
