The death roll from London floods has been strong in the Montreal and English gales remained at 25, de spite a escond overflow of the Thames Sunday which brought new suffering and additional damage to many sec tions of this city.

Lord Desborough, Chairman of the Thames Conservatory Board said yes 50.00 terday that the flood was due to 25.00 tidal wave from the North Sea, not 5.00 from Thames flood waters.

He said that on New Year's Day, when it snowed heavily after the 25.00 Thames already had reached a high-00.00 water stage, he was sick in bed and 45.55 realized that a disaster would occur 58.58 if there were a thaw. He had a baro 8.00 meter brought to his bed and prayed 1.05 night and day that the weather would 79.68 remain cold.
