

NEWLY ELECTED ALDERMEN TOOK OATH OF OFFICE LAST EVENING; STANDING COMMITTEES NAMED

The five aldermen returned by acclamation to the city council to serve for the next two years were formally sworn into office by His Worship Mayor Clark at the city council chamber last evening. City Marshal Murray Patterson administered the oath. The aldermen sworn in were Messrs Mitchell for Wellington Ward, W. G. Quinn for St. Ann's Ward, J. A. Thompson for Carleton Ward, Harry C. Jewett for Queens' Ward and Parker Currier for Kings Ward. They signed the roll in the order named.

City Clerk Haviland read the certificate of election and gave a list of the candidates put in nomination for the offices of Mayor and Alderman, all of whom had been returned by acclamation.

His Worship the Mayor cordially welcomed the aldermen who had been re-elected and also the new aldermen to the board. He hoped that all would give close attention to the business of the council and that their relations would be cordial.

Ald. Currier moved that Ald. Mitchell be deputy Mayor for the ensuing year which motion was unanimously adopted.

Ald. Mitchell in a few well chosen words returned thanks for the honor conferred upon him. He also thanked His Worship for the hearty welcome extended to the new aldermen.

Standing Committees.

The appointment of standing committees for the ensuing year resulted as follows:

His Worship the Mayor be chairman of the general committee of the Council.

Finance: Alds. Thompson, (chairman) Jewett and Goodspeed.

Water and Sewerage: Alds. Mitchell (chairman), Currier and Smith.

Roads and Streets: Alds. Currier (chairman), Ross, Jewett, Quinn, Mitchell.

Street Lighting: Alds. Jewett (chairman) Hay and Goodspeed.

Fire Department: Alds. Bull (chairman) Ross, Mitchell, Quinn and Currier.

Contingencies: Alds. Ross (chairman), Thompson, Quinn and Bull.

City Hall and Market: Alds. Quinn (chairman) Currier, Hay, Thompson and Bull.

Wharves and Cemetery: Alds. Hay (chairman), Alds. Quinn Thompson and Goodspeed.

Municipal Home: Alds. Smith (chairman) Quinn, Jewett and Bull.

Administration of Justice: Alds. Goodspeed (chairman) Thompson, Smith and Mitchell.

Legislation: Alds. Goodspeed (chairman) Ross, Mitchell and Currier.

Ald. Quinn and Mitchell were appointed to represent the council in the trustee board of the Victoria Public Hospital.

Ald. Hay was appointed to represent the council in the Victorian Order of Nurses.

Buildings Committee: Alds. Mitchell and Goodspeed.

It was resolved that all committees meet at the Mayor's office on the Monday before the first Tuesday of each month at 8 o'clock p. m.

An application was read from D. W. Olts for permission to erect a

service station on the corner of Regent and Campbell streets.

Ald. Bull thought that neighboring property holders might raise an objection.

Ald. Mitchell said there was a filling station at the corner of Northumberland and King Streets which was one of the most attractive spots of the city.

Ald. Currier thought a filling station would be far more preferable to the present buildings concerning which there had been many complaints. He did not think there could be the same objection to a filling station that there would be to a garage.

Ald. Bull thought it might be advisable to let the matter stand over until the next meeting.

Ald. Ross saw no objection to a filling station. It would be necessary he said to give notice to tenants to vacate the present buildings before February 1st.

On motion of Ald. Ross the application of Mr. Olts was approved subject to the city by-laws and the approval of the city engineer.

Ald. Ross made application in behalf of the Maritime Dental Parlor for permission to install an electric sign in Queen Street over Diblee's drug store.

On motion the application was granted subject to the approval of the city engineer.

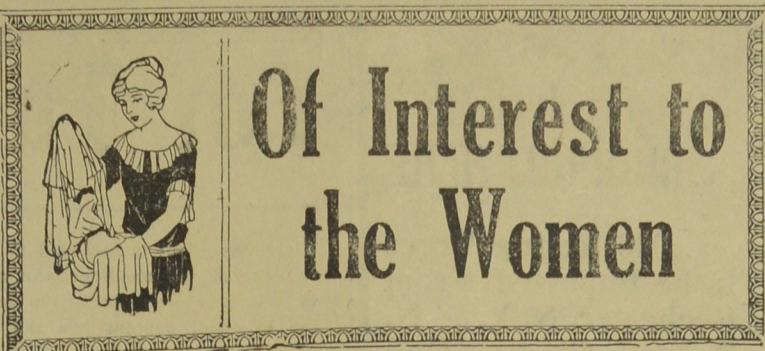
On motion of Ald. Mitchell the council adjourned sine die.

ONTARIO WELL SATISFIED WITH GOVT. CONTROL

Atlantic City, N. J., Jan. 9—Premier Ferguson of Ontario said here last night that seven months of Government control of the sale of liquor in that province had convinced him that the province would never return to the old conditions. "Before the new law went into effect," he said, "there was a spirit of lawlessness developing, crimes of a serious character being directly traceable to the situation. After a full decade the Government of which I was Prime Minister began to inquire as to the feeling of the people for Government control of liquor sales, the election proving there was a demand for it. Our policy is not to push the sale of liquors. On the contrary, we endeavor to restrain it in the form of control. Our people for the most part are temperate. Those who abuse the privilege of obtaining liquors under Government permits are deprived of it and those who indulge in drunkenness are punished. There is now a state law against drunkenness whereas the offense was formerly punished by local police courts, as against municipal ordinance.

"Records of the courts will reveal that cases of drunkenness have increased. That does not indicate that there is more drunkenness now than before the new regime, but rather that the drunkards are being checked up. Formerly, it was customary for police courts to turn loose large numbers of those arrested for intoxication. Under the law now in effect this cannot be done. Those who become tipsy and appear in public must be punished."

APPLE PUDDING.

1 qt. apples
6 thin slices of bread
1-4 cup brown sugar
1-2 cup syrup
1 tablespoon butter or margarine
Wash, pare, quarter and core the apples. Brush casserole dish with butter put three slices of bread on bottom, cover with half of the apples and the brown sugar; another layer of bread, apples and the syrup; cover and bake in slow oven forty five minutes, or until the apples are done you can sprinkle with cinnamon or a little grated nutmeg. Serve in the dish in which it is baked.

WHITE MOUNTAIN CAKE

1-3 cup shortening
3-4 cup sugar
1-2 teaspoon salt
2 cups flour
3-4 cup milk
2 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon almond or vanilla extract

Cream the shortening and sugar until light; then add the milk and flour sifted with the baking powder and salt alternately; also the flavoring. Pour in tube or loaf cake pan which has been brushed with shortening and sprinkled with flour bake in moderate oven 45 to 50 minutes.

Or you can brush layer cake pans with shortening sprinkle with flour and pour in the mixture; bake in moderate oven 20 to 25 minutes Put together with chocolate and raisin icing or any icing desired.

DEEP DISH APPLE PIE

1 qt. cut apples
1-2 cup brown sugar
1-4 teaspoon salt
1-2 teaspoon cinnamon
1 teaspoon butter
Put apples into a buttered bake dish with sugar, salt, cinnamon and butter, cover with biscuit dough and

bake in slow oven until apples are done about 45 minutes.

The biscuit dough is made as follows:

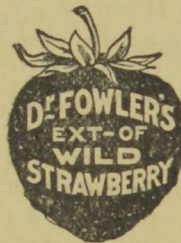
1 cup flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1-4 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons shortening
Milk to make a smooth dough
Sift the flour, baking powder and salt into bowl, add the shortening and rub in very lightly. Add milk place on floured board and roll out one half inch thick. After it has been placed on top of apples brush with milk.

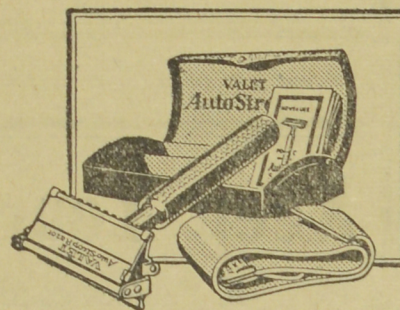
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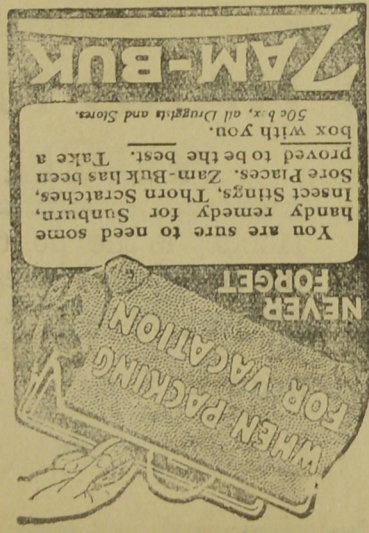
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
