

FRENCH ARMY TO CONTINUE WEARING BLUE

Paris, Dec. 30—Horizon blue isn't going to be run out of the French army by the more practical khaki as soon as was thought. There are uniforms and cloth enough of clear light blue to last at least eight years more.

Khaki recently was announced as the official French army uniform color, and on Armistice Day only khaki clad troops were used for the first time at such a ceremony. However, a stock of blue worth 400,000,000 francs is on hand and will last the army until 1935.





