A REAL AMBASSADOR.

Col. Lindbergh seems to be the greatest ambassador of good will that the United States ever produced. He goes about from country to country on the wings of the morning and is acclaimed by the populace as a conquering hero. After his memorable flight across the Atlantic last summer he was welcomed at the capitals of France, Belgium and Great Britain and the highest honors conferred upon him. On Dominion Day when Canada was celebrating her diamond jubilee he flew to Ottawa with a message of good will from the Great Republic to the south. Recently he flew from Washington to Mexico and was given the greatest welcome that country ever extended to a foreigner. He afterwards visited British Honduras and is now paying a visit to the Republic of Salvador. As an ambassador of peace and good will Col. Lindbergh is a great asset to the United States.

THE PERTH MURDER.

The brutal murder of Mr. Edward R. Armstrong a well known farmer of Lower Perth, Victoria County has greatly shocked the province. The fact that it is the third capital offense committed in this province within a period of less than three months goes to show that Attorney General Baxter experienced law officer that he is, was right when he obtained legislative authority last session for the organization of a provincial police force. As the result of his action the province now has an efficient force headed by a man who has had long experience in the work of running down evil doers. As soon as the crime was discovered Commissioner Salt was summoned from Fredericton and now with several of his men is diligently at work on the case. The indications are that they will get their man and have him brought to justice.

Trade statistics given out at Ottawa for the past year show that Canada's trade with the United States exceeded that with all other countries combined. Imports for the twelve months ending November totalled \$1,085,000,000 against \$1,002,000,000 for the previous year. The exports for the year were \$1,226,000,000 a decrease of \$79,000,000. Imports from the United States for the year were \$708,000,000 against \$665,000,000 last year while exports to the States totalled \$474,000,000 an increase of \$4,000,000. There is no doubt that the trade of Canada with the United States is worth more than that of Mexico, South America and all of the Latin American countries combined.

Montreal despatches during the week-end told of hundreds of Americans journeying to that city and Quebec to spend the holiday. The Chateau Frontenac hotel at Quebec, which is owned by the C. P. R. in addition to its extensive summer tourist trade has developed an enormous winter business. It has cost the C. P. R. a lot of money to do this, but success has crowned its efforts. No doubt the time will come when the fine winter attractions of Fredericton and other places in New Brunswick will bring many visitors from Boston, Portland, Bangor and other nearby New England centres.

While the provincial government has been criticized for certain legislation enacted last session the fact remains that this same legislation has brought a number of families into Fredericton besides providing employment for many people who were already here. In other words the only new industries which Fredericton has secured during the year just ended were created by the provincial government.


