CHARLIE GORMAN RETAINS TITLE IN SKATE MEET

Miss Brooks Loses Women's Title to Margaret McBride—Gorman Won Three Events.

Newburgh, N. Y., Jan. 2—Charles I. Gorman, formerly of Saint John, N. B., and now a resident of Detroit, successfully defended his Middle Atlantic skating championship title today at the annual events held on Orange Lake, rolling up 90 points in the men's senior events.

Miss Margaret McBride, of Toronto, won the women's title with a total of 70 points. Miss Lelia Brooks, of Toronto, was second with 60 points.

Gorman obtained his victory by winning the 220, 440 and 880-yard events. His nearest competitor was Irving Jaffe, of New York, who won the mile championship and placed second to the Saint John speedster in the 220 and 440-yard events for a total of 70 points. Jaffe also won the Joseph F. Donohue Memorial three-mile race.

Forty points behind Jaffe came Eddy Searles, of New York, who placed third in the 220 and 880-yard and one-mile races.

Willie Logan, of Saint John, gathered 20 points by virtue of his skating second to Jaffe in the mile race. He was tied in the point standing with Eddie Meyers, of New York. Allan Potts, of Brooklyn, N. Y., was last with 10 points.

Miss McBride won the women's half-mile race and placed second to Miss Brooks in the 220 and 440-yard events. Elsie Mueller, of New York, obtained 30 points by finishing third in the 220, 440 and 880-yard races, while Caroline Breiter, also of New York, placed second in the 880-yard race for 20 points.

MONCTON BEAT SUSSEX 12 TO 2

Moncton, Jan. 2—The Moncton Atlantics swamped the Sussex Colts in a southern league fixture here on Monday night by a count of 12 to 2. The local club, led by "Fatty" Gould, who drove the wager into the mess hall for an even half dozen markers himself, played the proverbial "rings around" the invaders and from ten minutes after the opening gong were never in danger.

A crowd estimated at 1,200 witnessed the battle and, although the count was one-sided the contest never lost interest, due to the brilliant combination and fine defence by the Atlantics.

Canadiens Further Lead; Bruins in Tie for First

N. H. L. Battles Over the New Year — Canadiens Defeat Other Section Leader 1 to 0 — Bruins in Tie for First Place in the American Section — Senators Win — Pirates Spring Surprise Victory on Maroon Heavies.

Montreal, Jan. 1—Canadiens wound up the year 1927 in fitting manner, as far as their supporters are concerned, by skating to a brilliant 1 to 0 win over the New York Rangers last night at the Forum. The game, a dashing battle between the rival sectional leaders of the National Hockey League, provided over 12,000 New Year's Eve fans with a fast and brilliant display of hockey in which the Canucks, although held to a lone goal, outplayed their rivals from Gotham almost throughout. Practically invincible goal tending by Lorne Chabot, however, kept the Rangers in the thick of the fight.

The one time he was out-guessed, was early in the third period when Morenz charged through the hefty Ranger defence on one of his numerous meteoric rushes and fooled the visiting goalie.

Senators Win.

Detroit, Jan. 1—The Detroit Cougars missed a change to go into first place in the standing of the American group of the National Hockey League when the champion Ottawa Senators defeated them in a league game here last night by a score of 6 to 2.

Fifty-six seconds after play opened in the first period Clancy shot from far out and Holmes in the Cougar net did not see the puck until it had lodged in the twine behind him. Detroit nearly tied the score when Noble passed in front of the net to Shepherd, but Connell made a wonderful save. Denny made it two goals for the Senators when he shot a wicked drive from the left board. "Happy" Holmes stopped the puck but it dropped down and rolled into the net. The Senators added another when in a scramble in front of the Cougar net, Kilrea slapped the disc high in the corner.

Pirates Surprise Maroons.

Pittsburgh, Pa., Jan. 1—Pittsburgh swirled from the hockey rut with a vengeance here last night to electrify a widely enthusiastic throng by overwhelming the mighty Montreal Maroons in a spectacular final inning rally four to nothing.

A splendid steel city defence held the dark red host at bay throughout one of the most brilliant battles ever beheld on the local ice, and in the ultimate session the surge of the bolden home tide proved utterly irresistible. Darragh, Milks, McCurry and Cotton, trusty buccannier forwards counted for the Pirate markers, all of which were reeled off within the span of eight minutes, but the entire Cleghorn squad distinguished itself in hanging up its second victory of the season.

The contest was hot from the initial face-off, but both teams were so tight defensively that neither was able to effect damage on the attack. "Hooley" Smith carried the brunt of the Maroon onslaught.

Bruins Tie For First Place.

New York, Jan. 1—The Boston Bruins moved into a tie with the Rangers for first place in the American group of the National Hockey League tonight by defeating the New York Americans by 3 to 2. Lionel Hitchman Bruins defence star, was the hero of the struggle, scoring twice and engineering a third goal.

In the opening period, "Red" Green counted for the Americans which was equalized by Hitchman. The Americans went in front again on a goal by Conacher just before the second session closed. Hitchman again tied the score in the third period and Frank Frederickson netted a rebound off Hitchman's shot to clinch the game shortly afterwards.

MONTREAL MAY GET WRIGLEY SWIM CONTRACT

Negotiations For Big Swim Now Going on—Berlin Too Far Away—U. S. City May Get Call.

Montreal, Jan. 3—The chances of Montreal getting the big Wrigley \$50,000 swim in 1928 are looking up.

It is understood that the Wrigley people who first thought of holding the swim in Berlin, Germany, have come to the conclusion that it would not be a very great success there, and will most likely bestow it upon Montreal or some United States city. Several United States cities which have heard of the change of plans are already strenuously competing for the privilege of holding it, but it is understood that G. A. Ross, the president of the Canadian Wrigley Company, with headquarters at Toronto, just at present favors Montreal, where George Young is very well known and liked on account of his brilliant bridge-to-bridge victories.

A visit from Mr. Ross is expected shortly, when various possible stretches of water where the swim might be held will be looked over and a general survey from every angle will be made.

C.A.H. RULES IN USE HERE THIS WINTER

Goal Umpires.

There shall be one umpire behind each goal. He shall inform the referee when a goal has been scored. But the decision of the referee shall be final.

Goal Keeper.

(a) The goal keeper may stop the puck in any position or manner he wishes, but shall not throw or hold it, except to clear by throwing it back of the goal line, and no other player of the defending side, other than the goal keeper shall, during the play, lie, sit, kneel, or slide along the ice in the goal keeper's territory. The goal keeper may wear pads a face protector, but must not wear a garment which would give him undue assistance in keeping goal.

(b) Goal keepers' pads shall not exceed a maximum width of ten inches measured while lying flat.



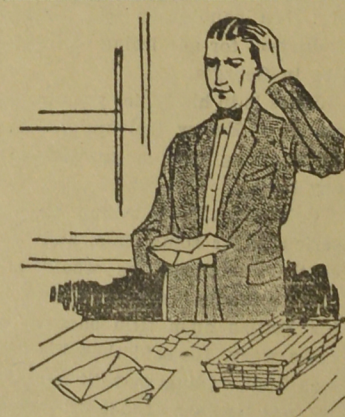
