Last night's contest was only a mediocre exhibition of hockey. Toronto's victory places them in a tie for second place with the Montreal Maroons and Ottawa Senators who defeated Canadiens.

## FLASHES ON SOME OF PHILIPPINE ISLAND FIGHTERS

Coming in Drove to U. S.—Stick to Lighter Divisions — Frank Churchill Leading.

Sidney, Jan. 30—Philippine fighters have come to play an important part in our fight history. With the success of Pancho Villa, who garnered both the national and world flyweight titles in our rings the punch throwers from the islands have been coming in droves. Their coming has stimulated interest in the smaller divisions as the Filipinos, without exception are the most furious boxers in the ring today.

They fight with an viciousness of their own throwing viciousness and have readily adapted themselves to the American code of glove tossing.

Boxing was introduced in the Philippines by American soldiers and only there, the natives taking to the game with such eagerness that it is now the leading sport of the islands. Much credit for the development of the game must go to Frank Churchill now a leading boxing impresario.

He discovered and prepared Pancho Villa for the world flyweight title.

Under Churchill's direction the brown 'buzz-saw' won the American flyweight honors from Johnny Buff and shortly after annexed the world title by putting the snore on the great Jimmy Wilde. Villa whom death cut down in the midst of his triumphs was regarded by some critics as the greatest flyweight that ever lived.

Churchill next presented Pete Sarmiento one of the most pleasing fighters ever to trade a punch. Although never a champion, Sarmiento piled up a record that will go down in boxing history. Sarmiento lacked boxing skill but was ever ready to mix and won renown by his punching accomplishments.

Of youngsters there is little doubt that the combination would supply a menace of substantial proportions to the other American League clubs.




