A rocky start and a couple of wild pitches sent three more tallies over, making six. Thereafter "Tot" settled down and was invincible.

Tilden's failure in international tennis in the last two years has marked the passing of the greatest individual that the game produced. Joie Ray announces that he is retiring. His failure in the distance that age is taking its toll. Hahn like Ray, plans to retire as the result of his failure in the Olympic Games, where he was badly outclassed. Paddock is through as a sprinter. There are at least three better men in his own country and there are a number outside the United States. Heart trouble has forced DeMar out of distance running, also age. Cobb, Speaker and Collins have been relegated to bench duty by Cornelius McGillicuddy. Neither of them is able any longer to play regularly. All three have grown slow and heavy of foot, too slow for the American League. Pinch batting is their main work now and since all three are wealthy enough to retire they would prefer retirement to work in minor leagues. They will no longer be seen in the majors except as coaches and Cobb and Speaker at least will not be satisfied with such lowly calling.

Tunney, considering the present crop of heavyweights could continue as title holder for a number of years and Milburn certainly could remain in international competition for several years more.

Tunney and Milburn retire as the best in their sports. The others leave the Big Tent overshadowed by a number of younger rivals.

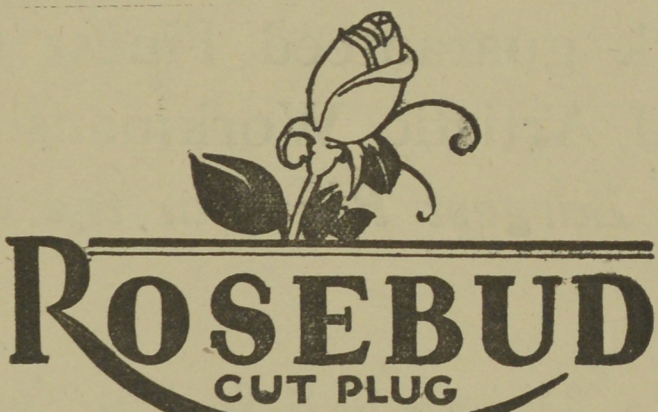

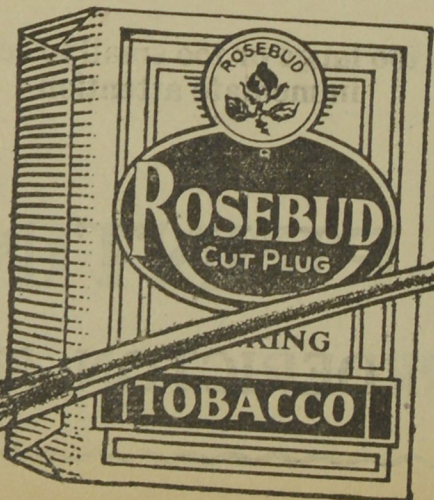
