

YORK COUNTY BOY IN THE NEW B. C. CABINET

Hon. F. P. Burden is Minister of Lands and Forests—a Native of Queensbury and a Graduate of U. N. B.

Friends here will be delighted to learn that Mr. Fred P. Burden a York County boy, who was elected to the British Columbia Legislature at the recent election, was yesterday sworn in as Minister of Lands and Forests in the Conservative administration formed by Premier S. F. Tolmie. Hon. Mr. Burden was a visitor to Fredericton early this month and while here intimated to friends that he had been offered a portfolio and had the matter of acceptance under consideration. He came east on private business and returned home about a fortnight ago.

Hon. Mr. Burden is a native of the Parish of Queensbury, York County, and is about fifty years of age. He was graduated from the U. N. B. in 1900 taking a diploma in civil engineering and afterwards completed a post graduate course at McGill University. He went west about twenty-five years ago locating at Fort George where he has practised his profession with considerable success. Hon. Mr. Burden is married to a Fredericton girl, his wife having been a daughter of the late Rev. G. B. Payson of this city. They have been blessed with three children, two boys and a girl. Mr. Geo. F. Burden of the New Brunswick Department of Lands and Mines is a brother of the new minister and Mrs. George L. Slipp of Queensbury is a sister. Mrs. Hagerman, wife of Dr. H. H. Hagerman of the Provincial Normal School staff, is a cousin.

CAPTURED MEN PROVE TO BE HOME INMATES

Two Escaped Inmates of Indus. Home at St. John Not Connected With Beaugard Mystery.

The report that the two men arrested yesterday at Palmer's Point near St. John, were thought to be connected with the Beaugard murder mystery, was confuted this morning by Assistant Commissioner Morgan of the Provincial Police headquarters in this city. It has been ascertained that the two men, one white and the other colored, who were arrested yesterday near Long's Point, because of suspicious actions, were two inmates of the Industrial Home at St. John. The two had escaped from the home and were making their way up river when taken into custody. Two others had escaped but had gone in the other direction. It is not yet known whether they have been captured yet or not.

INDIANS FROM RESERVE FINED IN LIQUOR CASE

Wm. Sappier and H. Solomon Each Fined \$50 Apiece With the Choice of Jail Term—Other Remanded.

Fines of \$50 each, or three months in jail was the sentence imposed by the police magistrate on Henry Solomon and William Sappier, Kingsclear Reserve Indians, who were proven guilty yesterday afternoon in the police court on a charge of unlawfully selling liquor at the reserve. Another Indian, Noel Sappier charged with being in an intoxicated condition at the same time was remanded for three days. Information in all three charges was laid by B. J. Griffith, Indian Agent.

The sentences imposed yesterday, marked the close of a slight Indian carousal which occurred on the reserve at French Village early this week. The Indians were engaged in an old fashioned house party with plenty of "spirits". At the home of Henry Solomon and were enjoying themselves dancing, and generally having a big time. 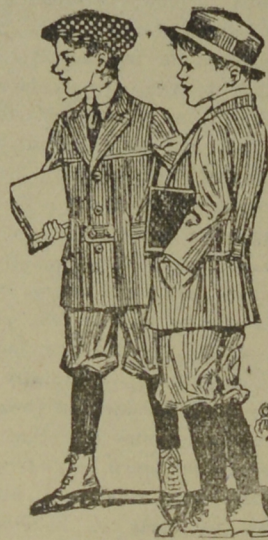
