MAPLE CUSTARD

Beat four eggs untill foamy. Add a pinch of salt, then beat in one half cup of thick maple syrup and three cups of milk. Stir until well mixed. Turn into custard cups, set in a pan of hot water and poach in a moderate oven until firm.

MAPLE CAKE.

Cream one half cup of butter, add one cup of light brown sugar; mix well and add one half cup of maple syrup and the beaten yolks of two eggs. Mix and sift together two and one half cups of flour three teaspoons of baking powder, one half teaspoon each of salt and nutmeg. Add the dry ingredients and one cup of milk alternately to the butter mixture. Stir in one half cup each of raisins, currants and chopped walnut meats and fold in stiffly beaten whites of two eggs. Bake in moderate oven and cover with maple frosting.

MAPLE NUT CAKE.

This cake requires one-half cup of butter, one half cup of sugar, two eggs, one cup of maple syrup two and one half cups of flour, one fourth teaspoon of cinnamon, two and one half teaspoons of baking powder one teaspoon of salt and one fourth teaspoon of nutmeg.

ORANGE PUFFS

One third cup butter, 1 cup sugar, 2 egg yolks, 1-4 cup orange juice 1 teaspoon orange rind, 1-4 cup milk, 1 3-4 cup flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 2 egg whites. Mix according to rule for butter cakes and bake in individual tins 15 to 20 minutes. Serve with orange sauce.

ORANGE SAUCE.

Three tablespoons flour, 1-3 cup sugar, 1 cup boiling water, 1 cup

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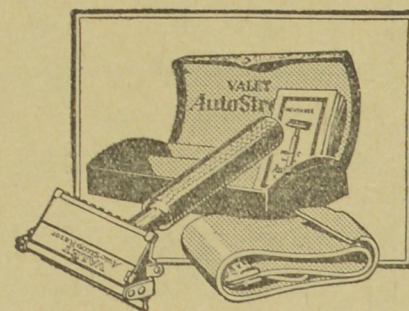
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
