WHICH RACE?

There are many profound opinions about the races of mankind. There are educated people who think quite definitely that one race is a great deal better than another. The Lady Nelson, one of the new steamers built by the Canadian National Steamship Company for the Canada-West Indies service, arrived at Saint John yesterday on her maiden voyage. Prominent citizens including Premier Baxter, Mayor White and Hon. W. E. Foster, chairman of the Harbour Board, turned out and gave her a most cordial welcome. The Lady Nelson is a splendid type of ship and will carry both passengers and freight. She will take on cargo at St. John and proceed to Halifax, where she will embark on her first southern voyage on December 14th.

The large orders for rolling stock running into millions of dollars lately placed with Canadian concerns by the Canadian Pacific and Canadian National Railways is a fairly good index of prosperity which Canada is enjoying at the present time. SUM OF MONEY LEFT HOSPITAL IN THIS CITY

as Executrix of the will of the late Joseph J. Fitzpatrick in sending you my cheque for Three hundred dollars (\$300.00) which sum was left by the aforesaid to the Trustees of the Victoria Public Hospital, their successors and assigns, to be invested at interest and the income arising therefrom annually to be used for the purposes of said hospital."

The late Mr. Fitzpatrick was a former patient of said hospital.

In her monthly report Miss Murray the superintendent, says the number of patients treated last month was exceptionally when contrasted with recent months. Class work and lectures proceeded without hindrance, the classes and lectures averaging 27 a week. Some changes have occurred in the order of lectures—Dr. Gerow taking Anatomy, Dr. Irvine, Bacteriology, Drs. Mackay and Wright also making changes.

Patients Treated

Eighty-three patients were treated. Medical casts 8, surgical 42, obstetrical 2, births 11, still-birth, contagious cases 2. No. major operations 13, minor 21, X-Ray exams. 21, treatments 3.

Miss Hunter, office clerk, submitted her monthly report, dealing chiefly with statistics. The total expenditure for the month was \$4,164.64 which shows in detail each payment which includes every expenditure for up-keep, maintenance, salaries, etc.

The president read a communication from Dr. Chas. Mackay, secretary of the Hospital Attending Staff recommending the appointment of Dr. A. F. VanWart to the Attending Staff of the Victoria Public Hospital. The recommendation was unanimous. The request was complied with, upon motion of His Honor the Mayor and seconded by Ald. Mitchell.

Marysville Grant

The Secretary reported he had received a cheque from the Town Treasurer of Marysville for the sum of \$250, bal. of annual grant to the hospital; also a cheque from the City of Fredericton for the sum of \$1,000. These will be attended to by the Secretary.

His Worship Mayor Clark, with the interests of the city in his mind, made some suggestions respecting regulations under which poor patients are cared for. The question received general attention and will be further considered.

After a motion of Dr. Ross requiring the payment of all certified bills the meeting was closed.
