THE COMING YEAR PROMISES WELL FOR THE MARITIMES

Moncton, Nov. 8.—That the Maritime Provinces are coming back strongly in the industrial sphere is indicated by the car loading figures released by the regional headquarters of the Atlantic Region of the Canadian National Railways here today. To date, the total car loadings originating in the Atlantic Region, which comprises the Maritime Provinces, from the first of the year was 207,000, as against 191,000 for the previous year, or an increase of 15,200 cars. On all sides the rejuvenation of the Maritimes is apparent, and the coming year should be one of the biggest in their history.

The factors that go to make up this prediction are many. Not the least of them is the spirit of optimism of the people.

On the industrial side orders for rolling stock by the Canadian National Railways in the Maritime Provinces have been placed to the value of \$2,500,000. The steel plant at Sydney has received orders for steel rails from an American railway which it is expected will keep the mills going full blast all winter. In addition to the rolling stock ordered there has been ordered 300 flat cars and 300 coal cars.

Sailings Increased.

The Cunard and the White Star Lines have arranged for increased sailings from Halifax to London and Liverpool during the coming season. In all there will be 37 sailings east bound. This is the first time in the history of the port of Halifax of recent years that these two large trans-Atlantic transportation companies have established regular sailings east bound from Halifax to ports in Great Britain. The arrangements for these increased sailings were recently concluded with the White Star and Cunard lines by Sir Henry Thornton, president of the C. N. R.

In addition to this there will be the new service of the Canadian National Steamships, being constructed for that service, the first of which, the Lady Nelson, is now en route to Canada. It is expected that this new service will be instrumental in increasing to a large extent the growing trade with the West Indies, in which the Maritime Provinces would seem to have a great opportunity to share. Since the revised treaty went into effect the increase in trade between Canada and the British West Indies amounted to approximately \$11,000,000. The annual trade now amounts to \$45,000,000.

This latter figure does not include the banana trade, which is now being handled through United States ports, but with the new steamship service to be provided by the Canadian National steamships, will flow to Canada direct. It is estimated that this trade will add \$5,000,000 to the annual trade figures.

ENGLISH TEA CAKES

Sift together two cups flour, three quarters cup sugar, one half teaspoon salt and two teaspoons baking powder. Into this mixture work one half cup citron chopped fine, one egg well beaten, and two tablespoons milk.

Make into balls about the size of walnuts, brush the top with beaten egg and dip in sugar. Place in pan about one inch apart, with the egg side up. Bake in moderate oven 350 deg. F., until slightly brown.

RICH TEA CAKE

1-2 pound shortening
1-2 pound sugar
1-2 pound flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1-2 teaspoon salt
6 eggs
Cream shortening and sugar thoroughly, add yolks and beat. Add baking powder to flour, stir flour into the egg mixture. Beat egg whites until stiff and fold into mixture. Spread to one inch thickness using cake tin eight by ten inches. Sprinkle one half cup of sugar and cinnamon mixture over top. Add one half cup finely cut almonds to sugar and cinnamon, if desired. Bake 30 minutes in oven 325 deg. Fahr.

TEA CAKES

4 eggs, beaten together
1 cup sugar
1 cup melted butter (scant)
1 tablespoon milk
1-2 teaspoon baking powder
Pinch salt
1-2 teaspoon vanilla
1-4 teaspoon nutmeg
1 cup flour
Bake in hot, greased waffle irons sprinkle with powdered sugar, and serve cold. Makes five waffles.

CHOCOLATE TEA CAKES

1-2 cup butter or margarine
1 cup sugar

2 eggs well beaten
1-2 teaspoon vanilla
1-2 cups flour
3 teaspoons baking powder
1-2 cup chocolate powder
1-8 teaspoon salt
7-8 cup milk
Cream shortening. Add sugar gradually, and beat well. Beat in eggs and vanilla. Mix and sift flour, baking powder, chocolate powder and salt. Add alternately with milk to first mixture, adding flour first and last.
Bake in oiled muffin tins 25 minutes at 375 deg. F. These are fluffy and very light.
